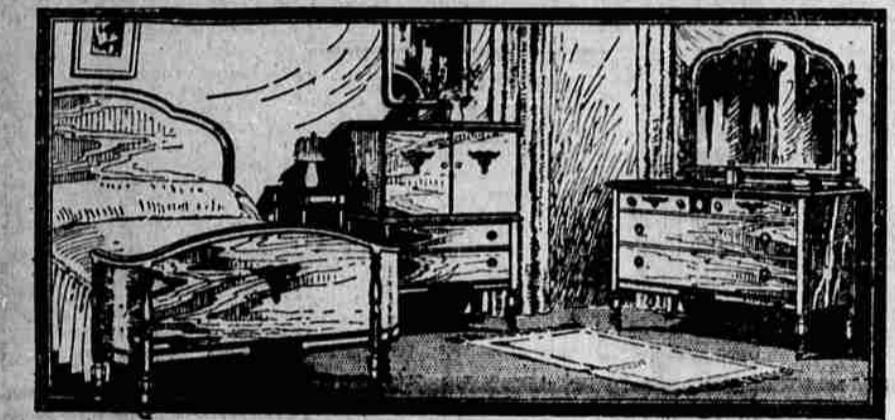

Oregonian Promises He Will Be Impartial
SEATTLE, July 8 (AP).—Jefferson Myers, of Oregon, a member of the United States shipping board, promised Seattle last night that he will work for the interests of the Pacific coast without partiality to any city.
"Give me support," he said, "and you will get all the ships you want. I am a western man; my heart is in the development of the west and there will be no partiality to any city. I am an enthusiastic admirer of Seattle and its business men and I'm interested in all of your state. I have invested considerable funds in Washington." He is a democrat, a former Oregon state treasurer and was appointed to the shipping board to succeed Bert E. Hantz.

EGGS HIGHER IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., July 8. (AP)—Fresh standard eggs are stronger in the local market with top grades posted a cent higher on the exchange. Extras now quoted at 30c and firsts at 29c. Other grades remain steady, unchanged.

The least-advanced in the local sugar market is now generally effective with jobbers quoting cane at \$6.95 and beet at \$6.15 a sack. The market is strong.

Receipts of country dressed meats on the street Thursday were very light and prices were strong. Choice light calves quoted at 16 1/2c and choice light hogs at 20c a pound.

Portland feed jobbers have announced an advance of \$1 a ton on corn making the new price on whole corn \$48 and cracked \$50.

Approximately one-third of the 1926 Oregon prune crop has been sold, largely to the United Kingdom and prospects for a fair profit to growers and dealers alike on this year's crop now appear favorable. This is the optimistic statement given out to newspaper men by M. J. Newhouse, manager of the North Pacific Cooperative Prune exchange, on his return from the east.

Newhouse found conditions in the eastern market with a wider interest in Oregon prunes. In a written speech he touched on national factors that have to deal with the prune industry there.

STOCKS CONTINUE TO CLIMB; BEAR ATTACKS BEATEN

NEW YORK, July 8. (AP)—The line of least resistance in today's stock market was again upward. Bear traders attempted to unsettle the general list by attacks against some of the popular industrial and specialties soon after the opening but the offerings were well absorbed and prices started forward again with over a dozen issues mounting to new high levels for the year.

Nickel Plate merger shares were again the feature of the railroad group with buying influence by the progress being made toward the addition of a modified consolidation plan affording better terms to minority stockholders.

Whereas, Catherine Creek and its tributaries, in Union County, State of Oregon, are frequented by salmon and other food fish, and for the purpose of protecting the same, the Fish Commission of the State of Oregon has decided to close all the waters of Catherine Creek and its tributaries, in Union County, State of Oregon, to-wit: All the waters of Catherine Creek and its tributaries, from its source to its confluence with the Grande Ronde River, in Union County, State of Oregon, to all kinds of fishing, except with hook and line, commonly called angling, for salmon and other food fish, between July 15, 1926, and May 1, 1927, and that between July 15, 1926, and May 1, 1927, it will be unlawful to fish for or take salmon and other food fish, except with hook and line, commonly called angling, in any of said waters of Catherine Creek and its tributaries, in Union County, State of Oregon. Any and all persons violating the provisions of this notice will be prosecuted as by law provided.
