The Indians lay their plight to the failure of the manager of the Oak Grove amusement park, where they put of a round-up July 2, 3, 4, to pay them the full amount of \$3,000 they say they were promised.

OTHERS COME TO AID STRIKERS ON SUBWAY CARRIERS

NEW YORK, July 9. (AP).—Indication that powerhouse employees of the Interborough Rapid Transit company would join the striking motormen and switchmen of the underground railroad were seen today when 60 employees on the night shift unanimously gave a vote of confidence to James F. Walsh.

Twenty-six of the 29 men belonging to the shift which works from 5 p. m. until 1 a. m., meeting in another hall, later voted to strike.

In the first accident since New York's subway strike was called, one car of a subway train was derailed early this morning between Bowling Green and South Ferry stations.

The train was in charge of a motorman recently employed. The score or so of passengers were assisted to emergency exits. Slight damage was done to the track. Smoke from torn insulation of the third rail caused some confusion. Service was resumed past the scene of the accident in two hours.

Two Arrested.

On complaint of a reporter, two detectives of the Interborough company were arrested, accused of assault. It is charged they forcibly ejected reporters from the scene of the accident.

PLANS CHANGED

CHICAGO, July 9. (AP).—Captain H. M. Berry was instructed today to await here with the huge biplane piloted from Mineola, N. Y., for the arrival of Linton Wells and Edward Evans on the transcontinental lap of their round the world trip against time.

Lieutenant Walter Hinton, ex-naval flier, said presumably other arrangements had been made to bring the globe girdlers from Seattle. He said it was likely that another plane had been chosen to get the travelers over the mountains instead of the big Sikorsky plane brought from Mineola.

27 in Elgin Trip.

Twenty-seven men made up the Elgin group of investigators yesterday—the largest crowd by far that has ever made a field trip in that district.

Meeting at the Earl Chandler farm, they discussed sweet clover for pasture and as a soil builder as it was demonstrated in plots there.

Winter barley at the Bernal Hug place interested many of the farmers.

Spud Disease Topic.

At Rex Roullet's ranch, Mr. Jackman pointed out potato diseases and explained how to control them. Some Burbank quality wheat that promised well was seen. The yield, it has been discovered at the experiment station, is not so good as from Federation and Hard Federation, which composes about 90 per cent of the spring wheat grown in Union county.

Grain certification was expounded by Mr. Jackman when the excursion stopped to inspect a field of wheat at A. H. Parsons'.

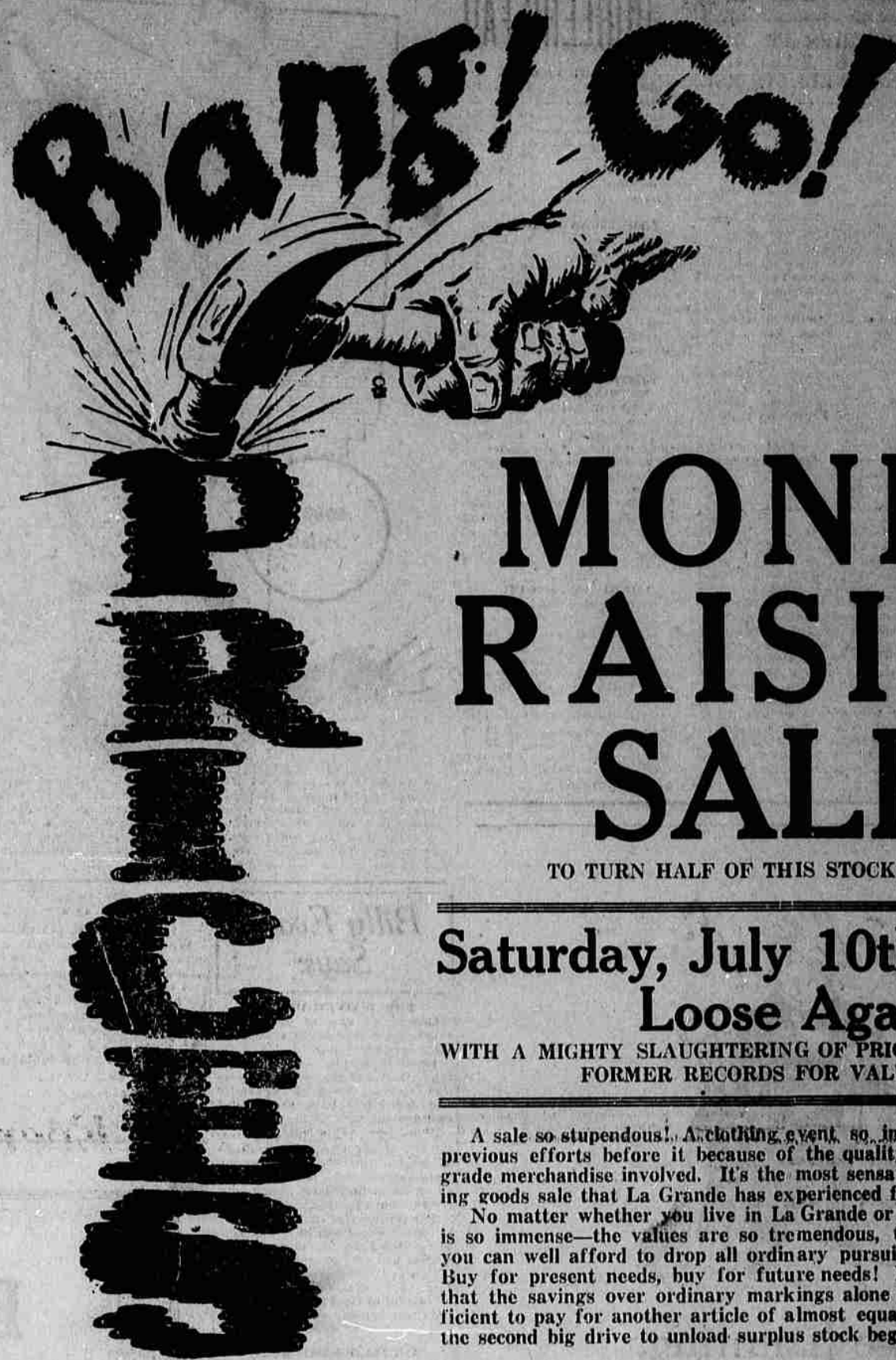
