SALMON RETURN HOME AND CRASH GATES TO GET IN

PORTLAND, Ore., July 10. (AP)—Crashing and splashing their way 100 yards around and over stones, through hardly enough water to wet their gills in order to reach the ponds where they had their first glimpse of life, 150 big salmon are peacefully cruising about the quiet ponds at the Bonneville fish hatchery today branding as calamity the idea that fish do not know the way home.

In their battle to get back, they crashed the gates of the lower ponds and liberated about one million salmon fry. These latter fish were about ready to be turned loose anyway, according to the fish commission. The home seekers are spring salmon weighing from 14 to 30 pounds. It is not unusual for them to return to the hatchery, but this is the first time they have ever crashed the gate.

Bobby Jones was in temporary third place with 220.

GOLF EXPERTS LIKE COURSE

Grading of the greens this month at the new country club golf course near Island City, is regarded with satisfaction by La Grande golfers, who are confident the links are going to be the finest in this part of the country. Their expectations have been confirmed by the opinion of every golf expert who has examined the site. Conditions, the devotees declare, are ideal and ought to provide a course 50 percent better than anything now existent in this section.

The grading is to be finished by July 25. G. L. Larison, chairman of the greens committee, said this morning. The water system will then be installed. By September 1, the greens should be ready for seeding.

According to the outlook now, the links will be ready for play May 1, 1927.

Remove 1800 Trees. Extensive clearing was necessary before the course reached its present stage of completion. Some 1500 apple trees and about 4000 small willows had to be removed. The ground was then plowed, harrowed and leveled. Several low sloughy places had to be filled to put the grounds in condition.

From five to 15 workmen have been on the grounds every weekday since the work started, and from two to eight teams have been employed.

Eugene Planning for Trail-To-Rail Fete

EUGENE, Ore., July 10. (AP)—With organization within Eugene fast approaching a stage of perfection, "Trail-to-Rail" celebration leaders have reached out to the surrounding communities and have asked for their cooperation in the days of entertainment, parades and pageantry that will mark the completion of the Eugene-Klamath Falls cut-off line of the Southern railroad. In a letter to representative men and women of the cities in this part of the state full details of what is sought were explained. Requests for floats, music and representation of the communities here by a princess to assist Queen Susanna in ruling over the celebration is given. According to the plan, each community will send a princess to attend the pageant queen.

Rehearsals for the pageant are under way and the spectacle is expected to be the greatest of its kind in this section of the country.

Local organizations are putting up their candidates for queen of the celebration and the queen contest will open Monday. "Queen Susanna, Belle of the trail," will be her official title. Robert Kuykendall of Klamath Falls will be "King Klamath."

The "Trail to Rail" celebration will be August 19-29.
