CONVICTS ASK FOR A PARLEY

LANSHING, Kan., July 10.—The mutiny of 375 convicts at the state penitentiary here who blocked themselves in the 730 foot level of the prison mine and held their 13 guards as prisoners threatened to become a prolonged rebellion late today, when they sent a message from the depths of the mine shaft saying they would live on barbed-wire mule meat unless Warden Mackey sends food to them before tonight.
