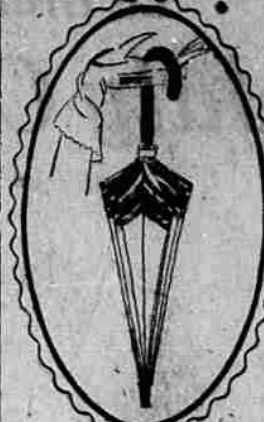

Sister Mary Says:

BREAKFAST—Stewed prunes, cereal, thin cream, crisp broiled bacon, whole wheat toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Cream pea soup, croquettes, molded spinach salad, brown bread, rice custard pudding, milk, tea.

DINNER—Roiled flank of beef, mashed potatoes, oriental beans, romaine salad, strawberry custard pudding, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

Even if there is an abundance of fresh fruit on the market don't forget the necessity of serving stewed prunes occasionally. And you will find that if they are thoroughly chilled and served with a sprig of mint even the most finicky will like them.

Oriental Beans — One pound green beans, 2 medium-sized tomatoes or 1 cup canned tomatoes, 1 good-sized onion, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 2 tablespoons olive oil.

Wash beans and "snap." Cut in small diamond-shaped pieces and put into a smooth closely covered sauce pan. Pour over boiling water to cover and bring to the boiling point. Reduce heat and add tomatoes pared and cut in small pieces and onion finely minced. Simmer for 45 minutes and add salt and pepper. Add olive oil and cook until tender, about 30 minutes longer.

If the beans are young and tender they will cook in less than one hour. In this event add the oil 30 minutes before serving. (Copyright, 1926, NEA Service, Inc.)

Dishes For Varying The Menu.

Mrs. Beth Bailey McClean gives here additional recipes for dishes that may be substituted to vary the menu she will use in her demonstration of the family luncheon at the homemakers' institute tomorrow.

Other suggestions:

Au Gratin Fish Flakes

1 cup oysters, cooked flaked fish or chopped meat may be used with 1 cup medium white sauce. On a glass baking plate make 8 nests of hot mashed potatoes. Fill the nests with the creamed mixture. Cover with buttered crumbs or grated cheese. Place in the oven to brown and melt the cheese.

Baked Macaroni—For 6.

Cut stale bread in one-third inch slices. Butter. Cut into strips. Line a mold with these strips. Fill with the following mixture: 2 eggs beaten, 1 cup milk, 1 tablespoon melted butter, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon mustard, 1/2 pound cheese cut fine. Bake 30 minutes in moderate oven. Serve hot.

Baked Macaroni With Chopped Beef

Cook 3/4 cup macaroni (or rice) in boiling salted water. Drain. Put a layer of the cooked macaroni in a buttered baking dish. Add a layer of dried beef. Put a layer of macaroni on top. Pour over 2 cups of medium white sauce. Cover with buttered crumbs. Bake 1 1/2 hot and browned.

Salmon Scallops

1 pound salmon, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 teaspoon lemon juice, 1/2 cup soft bread crumbs, 1/2 cup milk, 3 eggs. Flake salmon (or other fish) and remove bones. Add seasoned tomatoes, 1 good-sized onion, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 2 tablespoons olive oil.

DIRECTORS RECALLED

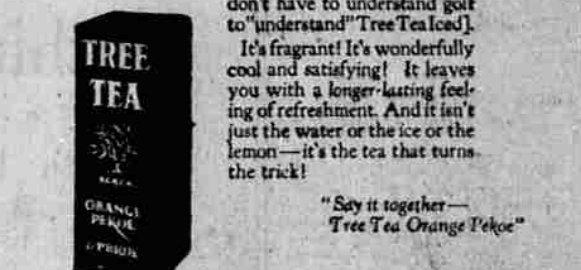

Kozer Calls Meeting Of Emergency Board. SALEM, Ore. July 13 (AP)—At the request of Governor Pierce, Secretary of State Kozer yesterday issued a call for a meeting of the state emergency board on Wednesday of this week to consider an appropriation from \$50,000 to \$75,000 for the flax industry at the state penitentiary. The money is by Philip Crocker of Spokane, needed to pay farmers for new flax now being received. The money will be repaid the state, it is said, as soon as the finished product is sold.

Fluffy Biscuits. "Fluffy" is just the name for these lovely, light biscuits. A recipe by a well-known cooking expert. 2 cups flour, 1/2 teaspoon baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon Crisco, 1/2 cup milk or half milk and half water. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Add Crisco and mix in very lightly with fork; add liquid slowly; roll or pat out with hands on floured board to about one inch of thickness (handle as little as possible); cut with biscuit cutter first dipped in flour. Coolidge Has 2 More Days for Signing Bill

MEDFORD, Ore. July 13 (AP)—A telegram to the Mail-Tribune from W. H. Gore of this city, Jackson county representative in the Oregon-California tax bill at Washington, D. C., reads: "The president has signed the bill."

PORTLAND, Ore. July 13 (AP)

President Coolidge has until Wednesday night to sign the bill to reimburse 18 Oregon counties for taxes lost through revestment of the Oregon and California railroad land grants before the measure will fail. This is shown in a special Washington dispatch to The Oregonian.

Oregon senators and representatives will at Washington await with suspense yesterday news of the bill from the president's camp but when no word arrived their spirits began to flag, said the report. Two days have passed since any word respecting the measure has been forthcoming from the president.
