

EMBARGO MAY BE DEFERRED

SALEM, Ore., July 12 (AP)—Officials of the state of Washington will be asked to postpone for one year the effective date of the state's embargo on Oregon chickens. Poultry men here yesterday obtained the support of the state livestock sanitary board in making the request. The embargo is to apply to all chicks except those certified to be free from white diarrhea. The Oregon poultry men think the embargo is unfair at this time for the reason that a campaign has been started for testing for the disease and it is said 50,000 hens will be tested this year. Several California poultry men conferred with Oregon poultrymen in Portland yesterday relative to certification.

Sheep Order Lifted.
The state livestock sanitary board yesterday lifted the order requiring the dipping of sheep shipped from the Portland union stock yards a condition being that the stock yards give the origin of all sheep received and the destination of those shipped.

State Veterinarian W. H. Lytle was authorized to attend a national meeting of state livestock officials at Lexington, Ky.

JURY TO KEEP ITS FINDINGS

LOS ANGELES, July 12 (AP)—If the grand jury of Los Angeles county takes its orders from Superior Judge Arthur Keetch, the jurist to whom it must report, the public will be kept forever in the dark as to its conclusions in the Almes Temple McPherson mystery unless somebody is indicted for the alleged kidnaping of the evangelist of Angeles Temple.

When the grand jury decided to go into the matter its foreman, William A. Carter, announced that in the interests of the public, Mrs. McPherson and everybody concerned a thorough investigation would be conducted and the result made known.

Last night Judge Keetch declared that the grand jury must keep its conclusions to itself unless an indictment is returned. To indict, court attaches point out there must be corroborative evidence of kidnaping and the only testimony along that line said to be available thus far is from the evangelist himself.

No trace has been found of "Steve" "Hose" or the second man Mrs. McPherson charged with abducting her away from the beach near here May 18.

The automobile in which she says she was dragged and abducted is still untraced. The two shafts, supposedly across the Mexican border, in which she declared she was held, have never been located despite diligent search by a number of possees.

TO BUILD VIADUCT

SALEM, Ore., July 12 (AP)—Authority to the Central Pacific Railway company and the city of Klamath Falls to construct a viaduct over Sixth street in that city is granted in an order of the public service commission today, provided the cost to the city shall not exceed \$62,000. Under the terms of an agreement between the city and the railroad company they are to share equally a cost of \$124,000. For the city's half of the cost bonds have been voted.

ATTORNEY REINSTATED

SALEM, Ore., July 12 (AP)—Morris A. Goldstein, Portland attorney, who some time ago was disbarred for conduct unbecoming an attorney in connection with the forfeiture of a bond in the district court was today reinstated as an attorney by the supreme court on petition and recommendation of the grievance committee of the Multnomah bar association. The recommendation was presented to the court after Goldstein had withdrawn a motion for rehearing of his case by the supreme court.

Foreign War Veterans To Meet in Eugene, Ore.

EUGENE, Ore., July 12 (AP)—Fred Stever, of Butte, Pa., commander in chief of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States, is expected to be in Eugene to attend the state convention of that organization July 16-17.

A business session will be held Friday morning at 10 o'clock at which time the convention will be officially opened. In the evening an initiation will be held, candidates to be secured by visiting posts. A grand stag party and smoker in the army will follow.

Officers and delegates to the national convention will be elected Saturday morning. Sightseeing trips will be taken Saturday after-

noon and Sunday while a dance will be a Saturday night feature.
