Sister Mary Says:

BREAKFAST — Stewed prunes, cereal, thin cream, poached eggs on toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON — Jellyed bread, savory potato salad, rye bread, ginger bread, milk, tea.

DINNER — Veal birds, scalloped potatoes, new onions in cream, roast, prunes and cream cheese salad, raspberry dumplings, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

When stewing prunes for breakfast, cook enough more for the salad.

Savory Potato Salad. Two cups sliced new potatoes, 1/2 teaspoon grated onion, three small new beets, 2 hard-boiled eggs, 2 tablespoons minced parsley, 1 cup cooked salad dressing.

Remove skin and bones from sardines, sprinkle with lemon juice and let stand 15 minutes. Dice beets and cover with 2 tablespoons vinegar and 1/2 teaspoon sugar. Let stand 15 minutes. Chop white of eggs and put yolks through ricer.

Sprinkle potatoes with grated onion, add beets drained from vinegar, sardines flaked in small pieces, eggs and salad dressing. Stir lightly with a fork to mix and chill for one hour on ice. Serve on crisp lettuce with minced parsley sprinkled over the top.

Pickled beets are at hand they can be used conveniently. An oil mayonnaise will have a tendency to separate during the chilling, so a light well-seasoned cooked dressing is suggested.

Extra Recipes Provide For Menu Variety

For housewives who find it desirable to vary the menu for the family dinner to be demonstrated at the homemakers' institute Thursday, Mrs. Beth Bailey McClean offers the following additional recipes:

Baked Halibut with Tomatoes. Put 1 1/2 pound slice of halibut in a buttered baking pan. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Put on top 5 three-fourth inch slices of tomato, then sprinkle with thin strips of green pepper. Bake in a hot oven 25 minutes basting 4 times with melted butter.

Ham Loaf—for 6. 2 pound fresh pork, 1 pound smoked ham, 1 cup milk, 1 cup cracker crumbs, 1 egg, salt. Mix well. Press into a loaf, shape in a dripping pan. Pour over the loaf 1 can of tomato soup. Bake in a slow oven 2 hours.

Apple Dessert. 3 big apples chopped, 1 cup sugar, 1/2 cup flour, 2 teaspoon baking powder, 1 tablespoon melted butter, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 egg, 1 cup nuts, raisins, dates or coconut. Mix in the order given. Turn into a buttered square cake pan. Bake in a moderate oven 40 minutes. Serve hot or cold with whipped cream.

Chocolate Jelly Roll. 4 eggs, 1-1/2 cup cold water, 1 cup sugar, 1/4 cup pastry flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup cocoa, Beat eggs till light. Add cold water, sugar and cocoa. Beat. Then salt, baking powder and flour. Pour into a 6x10 pan lined with oiled paper. Bake 15 minutes in a moderate oven. Turn onto a sugared cloth. Remove paper. Spread with orange marmalade or marshmallow filling. Roll up at once in the cloth.

Marshmallow Filling. 1/2 pound marshmallows melted over hot water, 1 cup sugar, 1/2 cup water. Boil sugar and water till it spins a thread. Pour over 2 beaten egg whites. Beat in the melted marshmallows. Beat till cold.

Favorite Dessert. 2 cups whipped cream, 1 box raspberries, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 cup vanilla. Freeze 3 hours.

WOMEN AND CHILDREN AIDED MOB

Howard S. Day testified that he had been paid \$20 by George Schenck another of the defendants to drive the truck taking baggage of the Japanese to Corvallis after the eviction from Toledo.

Too frightened to talk and too confused to know whether to turn for protection after the Toledo mob had dispersed and swept over the Pacific Spruce Corporation's group of deputized guards and raided the Japanese camp, the alien men and women allowed themselves to be herded down the railroad track and eventually on to machines and taken to Corvallis unresistingly, according to the testimony of both Japanese and white witnesses yesterday afternoon in the trial in federal court.

Dean Johnson testified that he and C. D. Johnson, president of the corporation, met the mob at the edge of the Japanese camp and warned its members not to come onto the company's property and urged them to forego their intention telling them it was a foolish thing to do.

In spite of this one old woman attempted to strike C. D. Johnson with a stick and when one of the deputies of the company ordered the mob to stand back two men stepped up to shield him and disarmed him, the witness said. The rest of the crowd surged over the deputies, beating them and manhandling them and rushed through the Japanese camp dragging and driving out the Japanese, he declared.

Lake Denmark Arsenal Dead Now Listed At 21

Property Damage Figured at \$75,000,000—4 Towns Harbor Many Injured Persons

DOVER, N. J., July 14 (AP)—Indications today were the exact number of victims of the explosion that destroyed the naval ammunition depot at Lake Denmark, wrecked the Pictinnny arsenal, and damaged a dozen New Jersey towns probably never would be known.

Even the lightning bolt that set off the \$75,000,000 explosion probably never will gain official recognition, as the only men who saw it close at hand were picked up dead near that building that was struck or have vanished.

The list of missing has varied from hour to hour and Brigadier General Hugh Drum, in charge of policing the area, has not at any time been willing to make any positive statement as to the number.

land, Luxembourg, Deville, Sucasanna and Ironia. About \$400,000 of the estimated civilian damage consists of claims for injuries to 360 persons. These claims will have to be considered by congress, as the army and navy are not authorized to pay them, and they cannot be taken to court.

Some Ammunition Saved. Estimates of loss in the Pictinnny army arsenal, adjoining the naval depot, were based on the assumption that none of the army's stored ammunition had been destroyed. Vast stores of ammunition remained intact in the naval arsenal today.

Jagged holes 30 feet deep and 100 feet across in solid rock mark the sites of two naval store houses that blew up first. Officers' houses and barracks lie crushed flat, as if they had been made of cards.
