(Continued from Page 1) victim, he was released on a writ pending review of his case and was arrested a month ago for carrying concealed weapons.

Cleone Killed
Joseph Cleone, 37, said to be a high lieutenant in the thinning ranks of the notorious Genna gang was called to the door of his home shortly after midnight and shot and killed. The assailants who were said to be only youths, escaped after an exchange of shots with a policeman.

Cleone's wife and six children were with him when the door bell rang and he opened the door to face the fusillade.

Revenge Cause of Murder

CHICAGO July 14 (AP)—The blind quest for revenge by an immigrant of a year ago who had lost a thumb in a machine lathe was revealed today as the indirect cause of the latest triple slaying in Chicago.

Sought Fourth Victim

Cleone was arrested within a few blocks of the scene of the killings when he returned in search of a fourth and his intended victim.

Plotted to Kill

Shortly afterward Cleone said he was discharged and unable to obtain employment because of his maimed hand, he plotted to kill Schwartz, foreseeing that he would need money for his defense.

He Obtained an Automatic Pistol

He obtained an automatic pistol and last week in a West Side "flop house" met Tommy McWaine, 26, just in from Muskegon, Mich., and also destitute. They loitered together for a time and agreed to becoming partners in robbery.

First They Robbed an Insurance Agent

First they robbed an insurance agent, next a woman and her escort, and then on Sunday night, Cleone said, they set out on another foray. They halted a taxiab overpowered the chauffeur, took his uniform and trussed him with the chains.

Proceeding a block, they stopped to rob Marie Blang, 25, and Frederick Heim, her escort, who had just driven to Miss Blang's house from church. Heim made a gesture of protest and a fusillade of shots killed both. Then Ludwig Rose, the chauffeur attempted to escape, and was shot down as he fled up the street.

REACTION MARKS DAY IN EXCHANGE IN WALL STREET

NEW YORK, July 14 (AP)—Stock prices displayed a complete reversal of form in today's market, an early outburst of strength during which more than a score of issues mounted to new high levels, for the year being followed in the early afternoon by a wave of profit taking and bear selling. Trading showed a further increase in volume, total sales crossing one and one-quarter million shares before the end of the third hour.

The reaction was not associated with anything in the day's news, but was widely regarded as a correction of a weakened technical position resulting from the almost perpendicular advance of the last eight weeks, or more. It started with the food shares, several of which have been under pool manipulation, but eventually spread to all sections of the list.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 14 (AP)—U. S. Bureau Agricultural Economics—The poultry market was steady and unchanged today with receipts totaling 108 coops of live birds. The general consumption of poultry has fallen off the past few weeks. This is not only a vacation period but salad season and the demand for the heavier foods has been curtailed. Two packages of game were received.

SHORTAGE OF FRUIT ENDED

PORTLAND, Ore., July 14 (AP)—Shortage in the apricot market was relieved temporarily yesterday by the arrival of three carloads, one each from Idaho, Washington and The Dalles. Prices range from \$1 to \$1.40 a lug, depending on size and quality.

Warm weather is boosting the melon market. The street is bare of good watermelons with prices sharply higher. Good Klondikes are very scarce and produce dealers are holding the limited supply at 2 to 3 1/2¢ a pound. Other varieties range from 2 to 3 cents depending on quality.

Butter, Eggs Steady
Butter and egg prices are again unchanged on the local dairy board. Demand for fresh standard eggs is keen with local buyers offering 29 to 30 cents for henney receipts. Butter remains steady. Local storage totals increased 17,325 pounds yesterday.

HOP CROP MOVES
SALEM, Ore., July 14 (AP)—With sales consummated here of 479 bales of hops the 75,000 bale Oregon crop of 1928, has passed out of growers' hands with the exception of 82 bales held by Benedict, of Albany.
