Sister Mary Says:

BREAKFAST—Chilled macaroni, cereal cooked with dates, thin cream, breadcrumb omelet, crisp toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Filled potato balls, sliced tomatoes, brown bread, prunes stuffed with peanut butter, milk, tea.

DINNER—Hot meat loaf, Delmonico potatoes, creamed carrots, molded Swiss chard salad, strawberry blanc-mange, graham bread, milk, coffee.

The leaves of Swiss chard are cooked and molded for a salad just as spinach is. Hard cooked eggs can be used for garnishing and a French dressing of mayonnaise served with the salad.

FILLED POTATO BALLS
Two and one-half cups mashed potatoes, 2-3 cup milk, 1 egg, 1 cup flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/8 teaspoon pepper, left-over chopped meat, 1 cup white sauce.

Beat egg well and add to mashed potatoes with milk, salt and pepper. Mix and sift flour and baking powder and stir into potato mixture. Drop from tip of spoon onto a well-buttered baking pan. Flatten slightly, making a depression in the center of each ball. Combine chopped meat and white sauce and fill each cup with this mixture. Cover with potato mixture and brush over with melted butter. Bake about 20 minutes in a moderately hot oven and serve at once.

NEW YORK, July 15. (AP)—Ezra Meeker, 96, famous pioneer of the northwest, will set out today on his fifth journey over the Oregon Trail.

Meeker is said to be sole survivor of those who made the trip in 1842 and has made the journey by ox team three times. His present undertaking will be by motor and he will be accompanied by Daniel H. Maue, a writer, and two chauffeurs.

Recipes To Vary Party Luncheon

Extra recipes to vary the party luncheon menu Mrs. Beth Bailey McClean will demonstrate at her last appearance on the institute program Friday afternoon are given here:

Creamed Chicken and Mushrooms

in Creamed Puff Cases
Pork Tenderloins in Brown Sauce
Sauté pieces of tenderloin cut and mashed flat. When brown, cover and let steam 15 minutes. Add thin cream to cover the patties and simmer gently 1/2 hour. Season with salt. Remove patties. Thicken the liquid in the pan with flour. Add a little lemon juice and pour over the pieces of tenderloin.

Baked Sweet Breads

Par boil sweet breads. Skin Macinute in French Dressing 1 hour. Drain. Season with salt and pepper. Roll in beaten egg and sifted cracker crumbs. The sweet breads should be cut into individual servings before crumbing if they are not to be served by the host at the table. Place in a baking pan. Put a strip of bacon on each piece of sweet bread. Bake 20 minutes, basting with melted fat.

Hawaiian Sweet Potatoes

Par boil sweet potatoes. Cut into slices 1/2 inch thick. Place in a buttered baking pan. Put a spoonful of grated pineapple on each side of potato. Cut a half a banana in half lengthwise. Roll in butter, then in powdered sugar. Place such a piece on each piece of sweet potato. Bake about 20 minutes, basting with pineapple juice until the banana is baked.

Chess Pie

Cover the outside of deep gum pans with pie dough. Trim edges and prick with a fork. Bake. Fill with the following mixture:

For 6 Shells

1 cup sugar, 1/2 cup butter, 1-3 cup milk, 1 cup walnuts, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 cup raisins, 3 egg yolks, 4 tablespoons flour, 1 teaspoon vanilla. Simmer seeded or puffed raisins in water to cover until all the water is absorbed and the raisins are puffy. Add the rest of the ingredients. Cook till thick. Fill the pie shells. Cover with a meringue made with the stiffly beaten whites of 3 eggs to which has been added 3 tablespoons brown sugar, and 1-2 teaspoon vanilla. Brown in the oven.

French Pastry

White, chocolate, angel, or sponge cake may be cut into squares then into thin layers. Put together with a butter frosting. Frost the surface and decorate with butter frosting. Angel cake

cut into two layers and filled with a nut custard or penneche but filling, then cut into squares and frosted make delicious desserts. Butter frosting is made by creaming 1-2 cup butter. Add 1 egg yolk. Beat. Beat in 1/2 cups powdered sugar. Flavor with vanilla, chocolate, or coffee. Keep cold.

Frozen Fruit Salad

1 cup stiff mayonnaise, 2 cups cream, 1 teaspoon gelatin, 2 tablespoons boiling water, 1/2 cup salted fruit. Whip the cream till stiff and combine with the mayonnaise. Dissolve the gelatin in the boiling water. Add slowly to mayonnaise. Fold in mixed sliced fruit as pineapple, cherries, oranges, strawberries, bananas. Pack in a mold. Put on cover of buttered paper. Add cover of mold. Bury in tray of ice and salt using 1 part of salt to 4 parts of ice. Let stand 4 hours. Serve on lettuce with mayonnaise.

Meringues (21)

1 cup egg whites, 1-8 teaspoon salt, 1 cup fine white sugar, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla. Beat egg whites until stiff. Whisk in 1-2 cup sugar slowly. Beat well. Fold in 1-2 cup sugar lightly. Put a sheet of wrapping paper on the bottom of an inverted dripping pan. Drop the mixture by spoonful onto the paper. Set into a warm oven and let dry out rather than bake for 1 hour. Brown slightly. Remove from paper. Serve filled with whipped cream, ice cream, fruit or preserves.

Ham Mousse

1 tablespoon granulated gelatin, 1-2 cup hot water, 2 cups ground boiled ham, 1-2 cup heavy cream. Dissolve the gelatin in the hot water. Add to the cold ground ham. Fold in stiffly beaten cream. Turn into a mold and let stand till stiff. Chicken or veal may be used in place of ham.
