CHAMPION WILL
DEFEND TITLEBilly Evans
Says:

Principal—Paul Berlenbach, of New York, world's light heavyweight champion, and Jack Delaney, of Bridgeport, Conn.

Conditions—15 rounds to a decision at 175 pounds.

Place—Ebbets Field, Brooklyn, N. Y.

NEW YORK, July 15. (AP)—The light heavyweight champion of the world will defend his crown tonight against the man many think should wear it.

Paul Berlenbach, of New York, product of amateur wrestling, is the champion. Jack Delaney, of Bridgeport, Conn., who once defeated Berlenbach in four rounds in the challenger.

May See Knockout. Fully 50,000 persons are expected at Ebbets Field to see the encounter, which is scheduled for 15 rounds, although few expect it to go that distance. The financial return will approximate half a million dollars.

Only a heavyweight battle hitherto has aroused such interest as that manifested in this fight. Some 500 newspapermen from as far away as Mexico will be at the ringside.

\$100 for Ringside. Speculators have large batches of tickets and the \$27.50 brand are being offered at \$40, while \$100 is asked for a ringside chair.

Delaney is the favorite in betting by about six to five, which likely will become even money at ring time. Some Wall street brokerage offices have reported bets at one to three that Delaney will win by a knockout.

NEW YORK, July 15. (AP)—Weather prospects for tonight's fight between Paul Berlenbach and Jack Delaney are unfavorable. The weather bureau reported today: High northeast winds with rain was promised before night. The sky was overcast but Promoter Humbert J. Pugazy refused to consider a postponement until later.

A GREAT SHOWING
Jones has made a most remarkable showing in the United States open championships.
He finished eighth in his first attempt in 1920. A year later at Columbia, he tied for fifth; at Skokie in 1922 he had his first big thrill, finishing in a tie for second.

Success finally crowned his efforts at Inwood in 1923 when he tied with Bobby Cruikshank for first place and won the 18-hole play-off.

The following year he was the runner-up to Cyril Walker at Detroit, while last year at Worcester he tied with Willie MacFarlane.

Playing off the tie in an 18-hole match, the finish found them all over again. MacFarlane won out on the second clash over the 18-hole route.

In the last four open championships Jones has never been farther away than second place. His remarkable showing in the British open makes him a favorite to win at Scioto this year.

SAVES LIEUTENANT
FROM SURE DEATH

PORTLAND, Ore., July 15 (AP)—

A woman's heroism probably saved the life of Lieutenant William J. Knaut yesterday, who had become entangled in his plane, which exploded and dived into the Willamette river. Mrs. Ole Islet, leaped into the river when bystanders declined to go to his rescue and succeeded in releasing him from the wreckage and assisting him to shore. A companion, Lieut. Raymond P. Parschall, with Knaut in the plane, made his way to shore without assistance.
