FALLS STILL HAVE BEAUTY

ENTERPRISE, July 16.—Hun-
dreds of people have visited the
recent cloudburst, sor-
rowfully, as if to a ruined shrine,
and were agreeably surprised to
find the beauty of the falls only
partly impaired by the water back-
ing up to lower the height of the
lower falls.

The cloudburst which last week
struck up in the region of
the R. C. basin came roaring down
R. C. creek or as it is sometimes
called, Cascade creek. Residents
half a mile below the falls plainly
heard a sudden roar but those near-
by heard the crash of timbers and
the grinding of rocks as well and
were frightened.

Terrific Volume

Investigation showed that an
immense volume of water had
come tearing down R. C. creek
carrying thousands of tons of rocks
and all tearing out trees, up-
rooting shrubbery, leaving a raw
gash along the creek bed where
before the little stream cascaded
down a fern and bush clad slope.

Water marks on trees as well as
gashes in the bark of trees left
standing along the way indicated
that when the torrent poured into
the river the water must have been
between fifteen and twenty feet
deep. A deep channel was flowed
out as though a giant machine had
traveled that way throwing out a
bank of rocks and mud ten feet
high.

It swept down into the river
damming the river and filling it
with mud. The picturesque foot-
ing 100 yards below the falls was
carried a little way down stream
and lodged, a drift forming under
it. There the water of the river
pours down over the drift, making
a fall several feet high. The water
backs up above the lower fall and
filling the little rock-walled basin
where the fishermen loved to cast
for trout in the pool below the
falls; where the spry eight-agers
climbered down for a close-up
view. The river was forced to
make a new channel for a short
distance and the trees along the
left bank are standing in several
feet of water.

Tons of Mud

Tons of mud, rocks and drift
were carried down the river and
a long bar may be seen in the lake
at the mouth of the main channel.

Bridges and foot logs along the
way were uninjured except the
foot-log on the McClellan place
which was carried away. A drift
was lodged against the west end
of the bridge first below the falls
and water and mud poured over
this bridge.

The river has not yet cleared up
and the water is still brown. The
lower falls are still in the process
of being washed out. The river raised two feet

and the lake was raised about
eight inches by the storm.

The drift holding the water may
be taken out with dynamite and
thus the falls be restored. The
desolation at the mouth of R. C.
Creek will remain, however, until
kindly nature covers it with
shrubbery and grasses. It was re-
ported that the forest officials
were to dynamite out the drift
soon but as yet this has not been
done.

There are many freaks of storms
and one of these freaks may be
found near the mouth of R. C.
creek where a tree has been thrust
out of the path of the hurrying
stream. It was a green tree per-
haps 12 inches in diameter which
had been uprooted farther up
stream. As it lies now there is not
a vestige of leaf or branch on it
and nearly all the bark is gone;
mute evidence of the power of
water on a rampage.

PASTORS URGE PENSION PLAN

EUGENE, Ore., July 16 (AP).—
Need of \$15,000,000 to finance the
new pension plan to care for aged
clergymen was emphasized in the
principal address at last night's
meeting of the Oregon Presbyteri-
an synod here. The Rev. J. M.
Skinner, of San Francisco, repre-
sentative of the board of relief and
sustenance of the western dis-
trict, was the speaker.

Skinner spoke in detail of his
plan, and his talk was heartily ap-
plauded.

"If the plan is approved, minis-
ters reaching the age of 65 years
will be pensioned," he said. "Each
church and clergyman must raise
a certain amount of money, which
will be put in the general fund.
Should the minister become dis-
abled before reaching the age of
65, he will be well taken care of.
There is also a provision to care
for the widow and orphans of a de-
ceased pastor."

"Enough money could be raised
by the church and ministry under
the plans to care for the younger
men, when they reach the age of
65. The purpose of raising the
\$15,000,000 is to help pension the
ministers who are well advanced
now, and who will reach the age
of 65 within the next few years."

A general committee headed by
Will Hays, former postmaster gen-
eral, is in charge of the campaign.
Andrew Mellon, secretary of the
treasury, is treasurer of the com-
mittee.
