No Slapstick in Denny Picture At Arcade

No slapstick. That's the vow made by Reginald Denny, the Universal star, and William A. Seiter, his director, in making their last four pictures, and careful examinations of their efforts fail to disclose a single bit of that familiar quality.

In "Rolling Home," their latest production, which is showing at the Arcade theatre today and Saturday, as in all their other pictures, they rely purely on humor, and possible situations for their comedy.

Which brings one to the question: What is slapstick comedy? Seiter's explanation is terse and definite.

"Slapstick comedy," he says, "is ludicrous, impossible comedy. It is comedy in its lowest form. It is interpolated action, having nothing to do with the story, injected just to bring a laugh by any possible means."

"A man falling down, sitting on a hat, stepping in fly-paper, having his car run away while he's drinking it, being clouted with a mallet, is slapstick. Two-act comedies rely on it almost altogether, in fact most two-reelers contain nothing else. It is the lowest kind of comedy."

"Real farce is entirely separated from slapstick. The farce is made up of embarrassing, compromising and ridiculous situations, slightly burlesqued, or exaggerated, but not impossible. A situation in "Rolling Home" is an example. Reginald Denny is supposed to be a wealthy young capitalist returning to his home town, although in reality, he is broke."

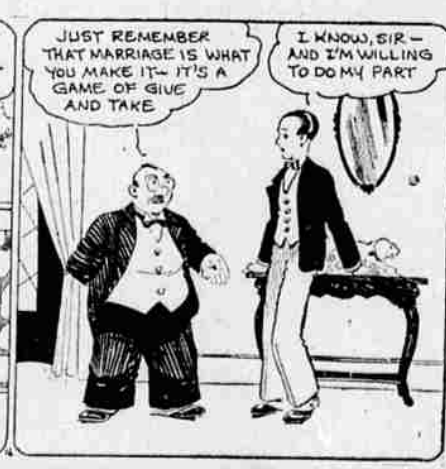
