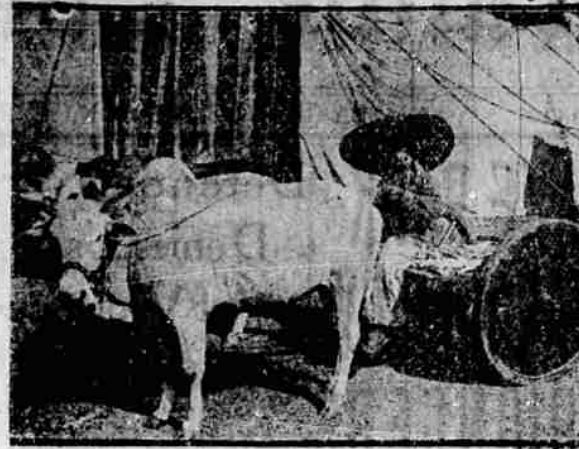

The suit is a friendly case to test out the question whether the signatures of 15 per cent or 50 per cent of the voters are required on the petitions.

WALLOWA, Ore. July 16—Mrs. Sophia Burrett Plass, among the early settlers in Eastern Oregon, and widely known throughout Wallowa county of which she had been a resident for the past 16 years, passed away Tuesday morning at 12:30 o'clock at the Enterprise hospital at the age of 83 years.

The body was taken to Summerville yesterday, accompanied by the children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren and other relatives and friends, where funeral services were held in the Summerville chapel and burial in the Summerville cemetery. The Rev. G. H. Pease, of Wallowa, officiated.

Mrs. Plass had not suffered from illness, but since last April her age had begun to tell in a growing feebleness and for the last two weeks she had been in the Enterprise hospital. She was conscious to within 24 hours of the end.
