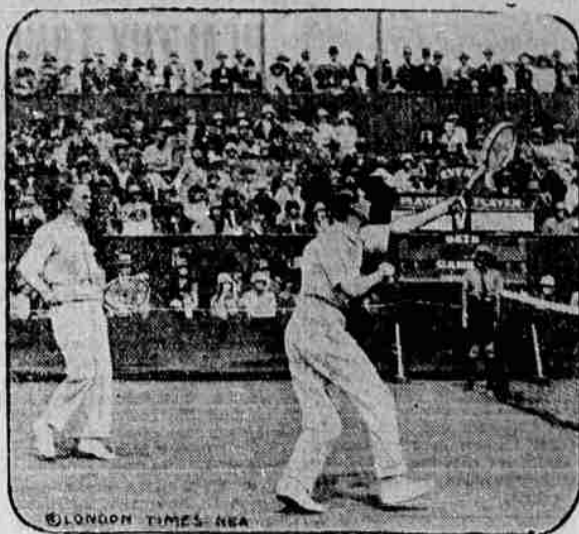

## CHAMPION HAS ALL THE ODDS

### Royalty Beaten at Tennis

NEW YORK, July 16. (AP)—Paul Berlenbach's chances of successful defense of his light heavyweight championship against Jack Delaney tonight, increased today with his weight. The champion today was five or six pounds heavier than he was estimated, than when he weighed in. This would give him a ringside advantage of probably ten or more pounds.

**In Good Condition.**

Berlenbach looked finely drawn when he tipped scales yesterday afternoon at 174 1/2, owing to a struggle to reduce to the class limit. Delaney was eight and a half pounds under the limit at 166 1/2 and although his followers considered Berlenbach's big advantage doubtful, Delaney maintained he was in the best condition of his career.

Critics estimated Berlenbach will exceed 180 pounds when the principals are called from their corners by the gong at 9 p. m. standard time tonight. Delaney, on the other hand is expected to scale about 170.

The Duke of York, smashing with his left hand, and his partner, Commander Louis Greig, being beaten in the Wimbledon tournament doubles by H. Roper Barrett and A. W. Gore, 1925 champions, in straight sets, 6-1, 6-2, 6-2.

### Precautions Taken.

Although weights of the two men will be taken, rules of the New York state athletic commission do not require that they make the class limit in the event of a single night's postponement. Fair weather is predicted for tonight, but tomorrow night has been reserved for the event in case of rain again tonight.

Thousands had come yesterday from various parts of the country to witness what many regard as the outstanding light heavyweight struggle of pugilistic history.

The park was filling up rapidly when hope of staging the event was abandoned at 5:30 p. m. Estimates placed the postponement loss to Promoter Humbert Pugay at \$25,000 due largely to the necessity of carrying over many employes for another day.

### Fair Weather Due.

Fair weather was indicated today by the weather bureau for the light heavyweight championship contest between Paul Berlenbach and Jack Delaney at Ebbetts Field tonight.

## PHILADELPHIA IS VICTORIOUS

#### FACE ACID TEST

No ball club can lose two star players like Babe Ruth and Bob Meusel and not be seriously handicapped.

In addition, several of the Yankee pitchers are ailing. It is possible that Walter Hoyt, who is having the best year of his career, may be out for several weeks.

It looks as if the month of July would surely be the acid test for Miller Huggins and company.

If the Yankees, minus Ruth and Meusel and perhaps one of the star pitchers, can stay out in front, retaining the comfortable margin of from seven to ten games, it will have passed the real crisis of the race.

#### MEUSEL MORE VALUABLE

While to some it may appear an exaggeration, the absence of Meusel from the Yankee lineup, makes as big a hole as if not a bigger hole than the withdrawal of Ruth.

Meusel, having his greatest season, is unquestionably the most valuable outfielder in the American league, unless your preference lies with the flatterer Babe.

Boasting the greatest throwing arm in baseball, Meusel is always a threat on balls hit into his territory. It's plain murder to try to stretch a single into a double or a double into a triple, with Meusel handling the ball.

Opposing batsmen are content to play it safe when they drive a base hit into Meusel's garden. That's a big help to the pitchers.

The temporary absence of Ruth and Meusel removes the two greatest threats in baseball, offensively and defensively, from the Yankees' lineup.

#### HARRIS ON PENNANT

"This is really an easy year to win a pennant in the American league," thinks Manager Stanley Harris of the Washington champs. "New York is the only club that has played consistently good ball. The two big winning streaks of 16 and eight games put over by the Yankees are just about the margin now held in the race."

"If one or two clubs had been able to keep within striking distance of the New York club, they would now be in a position to press the Yankees who are badly crippled."

"However the rest of the clubs have been busy killing each other off; in other words, splitting even, thus enabling the Yanks to stay out in front even though they have been off their game for several weeks."

"But it might be worse. The Yankees have tossed away perhaps a half dozen games by erratic defensive work late in the fray, or the club would now be about 15 games in front."

"Coupling a real punch at the bat with pretty good pitching, is the reason the Yankees are breezing out in the lead."

"My club, as well as other probable contenders, has been unable to touch a batting punch with pitching."

#### LOSES HOMER CHANCE

Any chance that Babe Ruth may have had to break his home run record of 59 made in 1921, will vanish if leg injuries keep him out of the Yankee lineup for any great length of time.

For three weeks Ruth has been unfit for play. With water on one knee and a "charley-horse" in the other leg, Ruth has not been in shape to do himself justice.

## YANKEE MUST GO TO PRISON

RETRUT, Syria July 14 (AP)—Dimitri J. Doty, of Memphis, Tenn. was condemned by a court martial at Damascus today, to eight years imprisonment at hard labor for deserting from the French foreign legion, in which he enlisted under the name of "Gilbert Clare."

An officer representing the government, as prosecutor, demanded imprisonment at hard labor for deserting from the French foreign legion, in which he enlisted under the name of "Gilbert Clare."

Doty, who is 25, is the son of Lemuel H. Doty, a Memphis attorney and is a veteran of the world war, in which he served with battery E, 115th Field Artillery, 30th Division.

He left the French lines in Southern Syria, where a campaign for the death penalty, Lieutenant Colonel, for the defense, eloquently described the brave conduct of Doty prior to his defection.

Was Decorated.

This conduct, he pointed out, had gained Doty the Croix De Guerre, and he asked that the court grant a suspended sentence. Hearing established "abandonment of the post before armed rebels." The judgment of the court martial declared this offense was proved but it allowed extenuating circumstances.

## THE SECRET OF MY FLAKY, TENDER

# pie crust

I CONFESS I have always been rather proud of my pie crust. But recently I have found a way to make my pastry "shorter," flakier and more tender than ever before.

The secret is in the shortening I use. Since I changed to Crisco I wouldn't think of using any other cooking fat.

I am sure if you will try Crisco in the following recipe for plain pastry, you too will never return to your former old-fashioned shortening with its uncertain results.

### Plain Pastry

2 cups flour  
1 1/2 teaspoons salt  
1/2 cup Crisco  
1 egg water

Mix and sift flour and salt. Cut in the Crisco with a knife. Add only water enough to hold the ingredients together. Do not knead. Chill thoroughly. Divide dough in two parts and roll out thin on a slightly floured board. Line a pie pan with one-half the pastry. Pinch pastry with the fingers to make a fancy edge and prick bottom and sides with a fork. Bake in a very hot oven (450 degrees F.) 10 to 15 minutes. For a 2 crust pie, line pie pan with pastry, put in a filling, cover with top crust, trim and press edges together. Prick top to allow steam to escape. Bake in a quick oven (425 degrees F.) 10 minutes. Reduce heat to moderate oven (325 degrees F.) and bake 20 minutes.

If a less rich pastry is desired, use only 1/4 cup Crisco.

### TWO DIFFERENT AND DELICIOUS PIES

**Chocolate Cream Pie**

2 tablespoons Crisco  
2 tablespoons flour  
1/2 cup milk  
2 squares unsweetened chocolate  
1 egg yolk  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
2 tablespoons confecturer's sugar  
2 egg whites

Melt Crisco. Add flour, milk, chocolate (cut in pieces), sugar and salt, and bring slowly to the boiling point, stirring constantly until thick and smooth. Remove from the fire and add beaten egg yolks and vanilla. Pour into a baked pie shell (see Plain Pastry). Cover with a meringue made by beating the confecturer's sugar into the stiffly beaten egg whites. Bake in a moderate oven (325 degrees F.) 15 minutes or until a delicate brown.

Whipped cream may be used instead of the meringue.

**Pineapple Pie**

1/2 cup flour  
1 cup sugar  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup pineapple juice  
1 cup hot water  
1 tablespoon Crisco  
3 eggs whites  
2 cups cooked or canned pineapple, cut in small cubes  
3 egg yolks  
3 tablespoons confecturer's sugar

Mix flour, sugar and salt together. Add the pineapple juice and water and bring slowly to the boiling point, stirring constantly. Cook 15 minutes, over hot water. Remove from fire, add Crisco and well drained pineapple. Pour this mixture on the beaten egg yolks and mix well. Pour the filling into a baked pie shell (see Plain Pastry). Cover with a meringue made by beating the confecturer's sugar into the stiffly beaten egg whites. Bake in a moderate oven (325 degrees F.) 15 minutes or until a delicate brown.
