"On Flanders Field" Coming to Star Tuesday and Wednesday

The war picture "On Flanders Field," which has been showing to packed houses in Salem, Eugene, Roseburg, Corvallis and other Oregon cities of late, will be presented to the La Grande public at the Star theater Tuesday and Wednesday under the auspices of the American Legion.

The picture clearly shows and tells the story of the world plunged into chaos. Besides the official films taken by the U. S. army signal corps, the "log of the U-35" will also be shown. This depicts the activities of submarine warfare which the allied nations defeated.

The German submarine U-35, on its first cruise to sea, sank 15 allied vessels and then returned to its port for supplies and to give an accounting for its activities. A few days later it left on its second cruise, but while "laying to" in a fog bank in the North Sea was greatly surprised when the fog lifted to find the guns of seven United States destroyers trained on her. When the submarine was confiscated and its papers and records sorted, this film negative was discovered and upon developing, revealed the U-boat's activities so perfectly that it was immediately the ship's log or history. The film shows these giant vessels beneath a cloud of smoke dive to the ocean floor leaving only a wreath of foam in their wake and several lifeboats with men drifting in midocean.
