Three Union Services on Sunday Card

Churches Foster Their Traditional Neighborliness by Uniting for Summer Worship.

Three union services Sunday will foster the spirit of neighborliness that has existed since pioneer days among the churches of La Grande.

To the Church of God, where Claude C. Pratt, lumber dealer, is the pastor, the parishioners of the Church of the Nazarene will reconvene at 8 p. m. the joint congregation to be addressed by the Rev. L. D. Meggers. His subject, he announces will be "The Evidence of Religion." Because of this service, the usual N. Y. P. S. meeting will be omitted.

Baptists and Methodists will unite with the Presbyterians at the M. E. auditorium for evening worship at 8 o'clock. The address will be given by the Rev. William Crosby Ross, who has been at Eugene this week attending the annual meeting of the Presbyterian synod of Oregon. Mr. Ross has acted as a member of the committee of bills and overtures during the assembly.

Sunday morning, from the pulpit of the Baptist church, Mr. Ross will preach to a joint meeting of the Baptists and Presbyterians. He is acting in ministerial capacity for both parishes during the absence of the Rev. George Albert Pollard.

At 8 p. m. Mr. Dunn will deliver a sermon on the topic, "The Checker-board of Life."

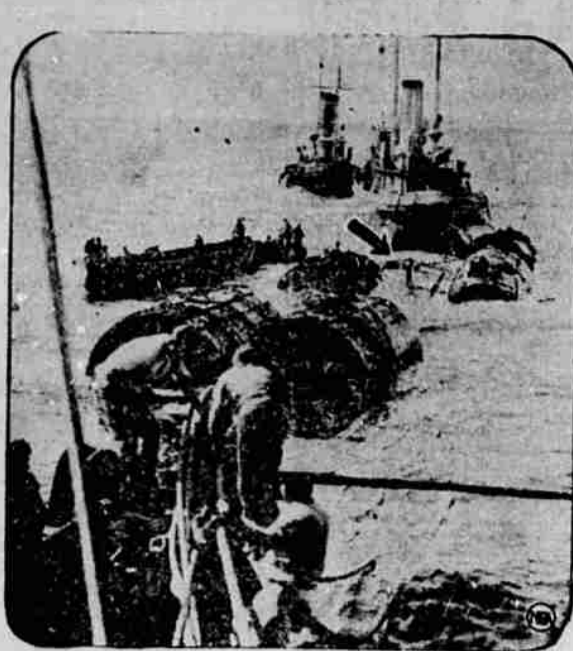
Franklin Deliveries Breaking July Record

SYRACUSE, N. Y., July 17.—This month, which marks Franklin's twenty-fifth anniversary gives every indication of being the biggest July in Franklin history. Following upon the heels of the national low gear run on July 1, when 185 Franklin cars in all parts of the country took part in a 100 mile non-stop low gear demonstration, retail deliveries have set up a new high record for the month to date.

Retail deliveries in the first week of July were 22 per cent ahead of corresponding period in June and 22 per cent ahead of same period last year.

The company has maintained a steady output of forty cars per day since May 1, when production was reduced so much as \$200. The company finds itself unable to meet the demand for models, although this single type constitutes 35 per cent of total production. Total retail deliveries for the year are already considerably ahead of 1925, the most prosperous year in the company's history.
