Shortly before sunrise the throbbing of the tom toms ceased and the monotonous chant of the squares and other braves and children ceasing the tiring three score and four remaining dancers, died away. The exhausted dancers and the aged braves seated close to the giant totem pole arose and joined in this feature of the three-day ritual. The dancing will end at sundown today.
