represented the law, ordered the crowd to stand back, and drew a gun. Persons in the crowd demanded that Markham show his authority which he failed to do. A half breed Indian boy grabbed Markham's gun hand and the crowd surged ahead to assist the boy. Markham was knocked down and offered no more resistance. The witness also declared he saw Owen Hart, one of the defendants, hit in the eye.

"After these fights the null officials offered no more resistance," said Marvin. He said the crowd went to the Japanese quarters. One of the Japanese came out and asked why the people were there. He was told that the Japanese were not wanted in Toledo.

Marvin quoted the Japanese as saying "We go" and that the Japanese then went to the doors of the houses to tell his countrymen. Marvin denied that any doors or windows were forced or smashed and that any Japanese were roughly treated. He said he did not see any Japanese with blood on their faces or clothes, and that Japanese were not offered or threatened on the streets.

EGGS DROP ON TODAY'S MART

PORTLAND, Ore., July 20 (AP)—Receipts eggs are 10 lower on the local exchange at 25 cents net. Bid prices to country shippers range around 24 cents with offers for white henery receipts at 27 to 28 cents. Other grades were steady and unchanged. Receipts yesterday were 541 cases with 54,275 cases reported in local coolers.

Butter remained steady and unchanged both on prints and cubes. A local creamery company is quoting a five cent advance in raw milk with \$2.25 per hundred being paid Portland on 4 per cent grade. Country dressed meals and poultry remain steady and unchanged at current levels. With the exception of light poultry supplies are about equal to requirements.

Valentino made it clear, however, that he is not in any quarrel with the Chicago Tribune, but merely the writer of the editorial. "It might have been written and slipped in at the last moment," he said.

SENDS CHALLENGE

CHICAGO, July 20 (AP)—Rodolph Valentino, shik of the movies, has addressed a letter to the newspaper here pleading for a chance to a duel, American style, with the anonymous writer of an editorial entitled, "Pink Powder Parrot" in the Sunday issue of the Chicago Tribune.

"A powder sending machine—in a man's washroom," the editorial writer explained by mail, "is a 'Home American'—why didn't someone quietly drain Rodolph Guglielmo, alias Valentino, years ago?"

Powder for "Men"

The editorial outbreak was due to the opening of a new bathroom where, in the men's lounge, a storeroom provides powder puffs and powder.

Valentino was here yesterday en route to New York and today the newspaper received in the mail, a letter signed by him and demanding satisfaction, American style, for what the letter termed a "scurrilous personal attack upon me, my face and my father's name." The letter explained that Valentino bore no grudge toward the Tribune but only against the "scurrilous writer."

Uses Rough Language.

"I call you, in return," the letter read, "a contemptible coward and to prove which of us is a better man, I challenge you to a personal test. This is not a challenge to a duel in the generally accepted sense—that would be illegal. But in Illinois boxing is legal and so is wrestling."

"I prefer this test of honor to be private so I may give you the beating you deserve," the challenge added, explaining that he is an American citizen.

Sie Means Nothing to Him

"I don't know who you are or how big you are, the challenge stands if you are as big as Jack Dempsey."

The Tribune editorial concluded: "Rudy, the beautiful pastore's dog, is the prototype of the American male."

The letter signed "Rodolph Valentino" ended with the postscript announcing that he would return to Chicago in 10 days and in the meantime could be addressed in care of United Artists corporation in New York.

MAN OF CLOTH BEFORE JURY

PORT WORTH, Tex., July 20 (AP)—The Tarrant county grand jury was scheduled to begin its investigation here today into the slaying Saturday of D. E. Chipra, lumberman, by the Rev. J. Frank Norris in the office of the First Baptist church of which Norris is pastor. Norris is at liberty under \$10,000 bonds.

Two possible alternatives he before the grand jury, which included nine of the pastors fellow townsmen. The body may indict for murder or may vote a "no bill."

In the event of the indictment and subsequent trial and conviction the degree of guilt is determined by the trial court jury, which may return any one of three verdicts. It may acquit, find the defendant guilty of manslaughter, carrying a prison term of from two to five years, or find guilty of murder, carrying a penalty ranging from five years to death in the electric chair. Under Texas law the jury fixes the exact punishment.

Second Investigation

Today's investigation will be the second grand jury considering matter involving Dr. Norris. Fifteen years ago an indictment was returned charging him with arson, after the church of which then was pastor was found on fire. Dr. Norris was acquitted. He charged the allegations against him were part of a conspiracy to injure him.
