HERMAN CLOUTS WAY TO VICTORY OVER T. FUENTE

PORTLAND, Ore., July 21 (AP)—Oscar "Tiny" Herman, Portland heavyweight, took a ten-round decision over Tony Fuente, of Los Angeles in the main event here last night. Herman was credited with seven rounds, Fuente one and two were even.

Red O'Keefe and George Dixon, Portland middleweights, fought a fast draw in a six-round semi-windup. Les Johnson, Portland lightweight, earned a four-round decision over Pat Padelford, Roseburg. Billy Winters, Vancouver bantamweight, scored a technical knockout over Bobby Watson, Dallas, Texas, in the third.

Billy Evans Says:

GROVE REAL JINX

"Lefty" Grove is surely the Yankee jinx. The sensational southpaw of the Athletics has beaten the American League leaders in four out of five starts, also saved several other games in the role of relief pitcher.

In all, Grove has to date worked 45 innings against the Yankees and in that time struck out 48 men, better than one an inning.

No player in the New York line-up has been softer for Grove than the great Ruth. Some years ago Southpaw Pratt of the St. Louis Browns was Babe's chief strike-out annoyance. More recently the mantle has fallen to Grove.

It is the exception when Grove doesn't set Ruth down on strikes a couple of times during a game.

GETS TOUGH BREAKS

Despite the remarkable pitching he has turned in for the Mackinnens, the record made by Grove so far this season, is not impressive. He

has done little better than break even.

On every ball club there is one pitcher who seems to get the tough breaks, by seldom having his team hit behind him or through erratic fielding.

Grove holds such a position with the Athletics. In four of his defeats he has suffered a shut-out and in none of these games did he allow more than three runs.

In Grove, the American League appears to have uncovered another colorful player who is certain to be a big card.

In this respect the junior organization has been very fortunate in landing stars like Cobb, Johnson, Ruth, Speaker, Collins, Harris and others of that type.

Grove is destined to be a much-talked-about man in baseball, a second Babe Waddell, although lacking many of Babe's eccentricities.

MACKS WHIP YANKEES

In looking over the American League records for the present season, I find that the Athletics have been the Yankees' fins as a team as has Grove, the individual.

Of the first 15 games played between New York and Philadelphia, the Athletics have won 10, a percentage of .667 against the leaders. As a matter of fact in the first 15 games played, the Yankees lost only 26 games, the Athletics turning in 17 wins. So while the A's were winning 17 out of 15 games from New York, the rest of the league could only win 16 out of 61.

New York has waxed '3 against the tail-end Red Sox from Boston with 14 victories out of 17 games.

Incidentally, New York has been very successful against Washington, winning 17 out of 15 starts from last year's champs. While Washington has obliged by taking 11 out of 15 games from Philadelphia.

The fact that the other contenders have been cutting each other's throat is another reason why the Yankees are so far out in front. Not a single team has played con-

Several years back the Pittsburg club started the month of September with something like a seven-game lead over the Giants, but was beaten by McGraw's club, largely through the ability of the Giants to knock off Pittsburg.
