RALLY HALTS EARLY DECLINE

NEW YORK, July 21. (AP)—Further irregularity developed in today's stock market as a result of a more extensive readjustment of speculative accounts, but by early afternoon speculation for the advance appeared to have regained control of the price movement. The morning decline was checked by a rally in the so-called "Durant stocks," American Safety Razor being bid up over three points to a new 1926 high while General Motors rallied several points from its low level to within striking distance of the record high established a few days ago.

The abrupt halt to the downward plunge of the French franc, which was construed as an indication of returning confidence abroad, continuation of easy money rates, and the optimistic tenor of the weekly stock trade reviews which stressed the fact that July production and demand had not eased off to the extent looked for by leaders in the trade, all helped to create bullish enthusiasm. Trading however, was largely of a professional character with no signs of any substantial increase in public participation.

The closing was irregular. Total sales approximated 1,600,000 shares.

Egg Quotations Firm; Market Tone Healthy

PORTLAND, Ore., July 21 (AP)—No change is shown in egg quotations on the local board but buyers continue to bid up strong for henney stock. At the same time there is less desire shown for current receipts, due to the poor quality and heavy candling loss at this season.

Butter continues steady. Receipts yesterday of country creamery stock was 21,684 pounds with the local make reported at 24,274 pounds. The market however, shows a healthy tone in spite of the heavy make and large cooler stocks. San Francisco butterfat is fractionally higher.

Country dressed meats steady at 17 to 17 1/2 cents for top calves and 20 to 20 1/2 cents for choice light hogs.

Light hens are still moving sluggish and prices are down to 17 cents with the trade not overly eager for supplies at any level. Other lines of poultry holding steady.

TWO WOOL CLIPS SOLD IN BAKER; PRICE 32 CENTS

PORTLAND, Ore., July 21 (AP)—Sale of two clips of wool in the Baker auction, aggregating approximately 225,000 pounds, at the 22 cent level, closed the market level in Eastern Oregon. The cent sale of choice wool have been around 20 cents and the Pullman and other clips show an advance of approximately 2 cents a pound in value.

The higher market is due to the fact that practically all of the choice wools in Oregon have now passed out of the growers' hands. About 200,000 pounds of wool, including some 1925 clips, is all that remains in the country.

There is, however, some 8,000,000 pounds in storage in Portland warehouses waiting for better prices.

LONDON, July 21. (AP)—There was a full attendance at the wool auction today, and offerings amounted to 12,572 bales. The market was slow and there were frequent withdrawals from the high limits asked by holders. Approximately nine thousand bales were sold.

ROSENBERG REPORTS DEAL

ROSENBERG, Ore., July 21 (AP)—Another ranch deal, the largest to be completed for several years, was consummated Tuesday when the Price Brothers, owners of several smaller farms in the county, purchased the 1300-acre ranch belonging to James C. Livingston and located near Glido, 18 miles east of Roseburg. The new owner will take possession the first of August and have already purchased several hundred head of sheep with which to stock the range.

Wheat Prices Average Lower Despite Rallies

CHICAGO, July 21 (AP)—Despite some sharp rallies, wheat prices averaged lower today as a result of better weather northwest and big receipts southwest. Kansas City arrivals continue on an enormous scale, 729 cars being received there today. Announcement that 40,000 bushels of corn on hand in public elevators here have become out of condition had a seriously depressing influence on corn values.

Wheat closed unsettled 1/4 to 1 1/2 off, and provisions varying from 25c decline to 12c gain.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 21. (AP)—A dash of comedy broke into the trial in federal court today of the damage suit by Japanese against six residents of Toledo, Ore. NOTICE OF CLOSING CHINESE PHEASANT HUNTING SEASON. Notice is hereby given that by an order duly and regularly made by the State Game Commission of the State of Oregon on the 11th day of January, 1926, it was found and determined that the supply of Chinese (Torquatus) Pheasants is being, and will be, injuriously affected by permitting the same to be taken, hunted or killed in the whole of the State of Oregon, and every part thereof, except Malheur county, during the periods of time hereinafter specified, and that it shall be unlawful for any person to take, kill or have in possession any Chinese (Torquatus) Pheasant or Pheasants, within the State of Oregon, except Malheur county, during the periods of time from October 14 to October 17, and from October 24 to November 1, 1926; and further, that every county within the State of Oregon where there is an open hunting season provided by law, with the exception of Malheur county, be, and is closed, to taking, hunting, and killing Chinese (Torquatus) Pheasants, for and during the periods of time above mentioned. 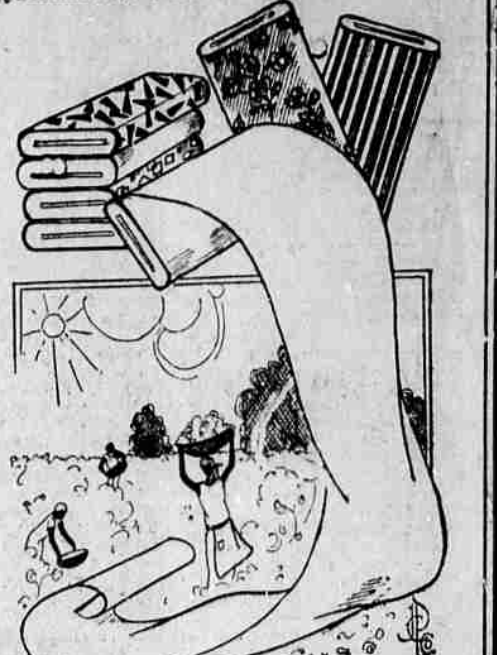
