U. S. in Good Position To Handle Foreign Trade

PAUL SMITH, N. Y., July 24 (AP)—President Coolidge believes the United States is in a better position to handle its foreign trade than other countries, and will continue to be in a better position and is not likely to lose any of the trade it has.

The president realizes there is keen competition in foreign trade but knows of no organization movement in foreign countries toward regaining avenues of trade the United States has entered.

granted a full and free pardon to Miss Martha Bates, of Whitesburg, a bobbed haired girl from the mountain section of Kentucky who slapped the Rev. Arlie Brown, Baptist minister, of Millstone, Kentucky, for criticizing women who bob their hair.

CRATER FORESTS SEARED

MEDFORD, Ore., July 24 (AP)—Crater national forests report to date that 3564 acres of timber have been burned over and 275 men employed since the first fire occurred in late spring. Sixty-five of the men are regular forest service employees, while the remainder were hired from the streets. The largest fire was near Aspen lake. Although only a small portion of the area of four or more thousand acres was in the Crater forest, a large number of men were engaged as fire fighters to keep the flames from entering.
