## AMEE, LAWYER MISSING TODAY

LOS ANGELES, July 28 (AP).—Amee Sempie McPherson, evangelist, central figure of a disappearance case which has attracted nation-wide attention, was reported today to be missing from his headquarters in San Francisco, according to H. LOS ANGELES, July 28 (AP).—Amee Sempie McPherson, together with her attorney, Roland Rich Woolley, apparently had dropped from sight again today.

Inquiries at Angelus Temple, McPherson religious headquarters, all were met by Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, mother of the evangelist, who contrary to all procedure in the past, refused to permit anybody to see her daughter.

Attorney Woolley faded from view last evening. This morning his home said that he had not been there all night and his office reported that he was not expected there today.

Newspaper investigators of the case were inclined to suspect that Mrs. McPherson, or her attorney, or perhaps both, had made a hurried trip to Carmel, where Deputy District Attorney Joe Ryan has reported unearthing evidence that a woman closely resembling the evangelist had spent several days there in company with Kenneth G. Ormlund, former radio operator of Angelus Temple.

Yesterday Mrs. Kennedy announced that her daughter would not go to Carmel as requested by investigators of the district attorney's office and the Los Angeles police.

## Woman, 73, Shot To Death; Daughter Held In Jail

Officers Found Mrs. Charles Warren Guarding Dead Body with Revolver in Hand

OREGON CITY, Ore., July 25. (AP)—Mrs. Melissa Bolton, 73, was shot to death last midnight at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Charles Warren, 28, of Canemah, two miles south of Oregon City. Officers, called by neighbors, who heard a commotion in the Warren home, broke in and reported they found Mrs. Warren with a revolver in her hand near Mrs. Bolton, who was lying of wounds.

Mrs. Warren was taken to the county jail here, and kept under close guard. The only motive of officers could assign today for the shooting was temporary insanity.

**Know of No Trouble**  
Mrs. Bolton was a widow and had made her home with the Warrens for several years. Neighbors and relatives knew of no domestic trouble.

Neighbors heard shrieks at the Warren home at a late hour last night, and called officers. Two shots were heard. When the officers arrived they found the home barricaded and were obliged to batter their way in.

**Pointed Gun at Cops**  
They said they found Mrs. Warren standing guard over the prostrate form of her mother, revolver in hand. They said Mrs. Warren pointed the weapon threateningly at the officers.

While a deputy diverted her attention for a moment, Sheriff Mass rushed the woman and disarmed her. She was then taken to the jail in the sheriff's auto. Coroner Pace was investigating more fully today.
