Workmen have been busy decorating the room, which is large and roomy, for the past week, and by Saturday the work will be completed. The shop is being furnished in a color scheme of blue, rose and gray. The floor covering is blue and grey and the draperies at each door of five separate compartments will be in rose and blue. The three colors will also be used for the large front window. The walls are tinted in the three shades, and grey wicker furniture will be used in the waiting room. The washroom, which is in grey, will be decorated with hand painting in a panel effect, rose and blue being the colors used.

There is a large mirror in each compartment. The room is also well lighted by two lights on each side of the mirror and one in back over the entrance to the compartment. Each compartment will be fitted with all of the modern equipment necessary.

Mrs. Best plans to start classes in cosmetic therapy soon and a large room in the back is being furnished for this purpose. She was granted a temporary license to teach by the state board last fall, but because of ill health could not begin the work as planned.

Mrs. Best has been a beauty parlor operator here for almost three years. Her first post-graduate class she had her shop in her home. Before that time she was located upstairs over the L. & L. Drug store.

## AGENTS MAKE MORE ARRESTS

BIFFALO, N. Y., July 28 (AP)—Federal agents and police today made six more arrests in the Niagara frontier rum-running case, the death toll of which stands at 25. The action followed statements of authorities that James C. Vothke, alleged leader of the distribution gang, stood ready to make a full confession, naming those higher up in the wood alcohol traffic. He is to answer a charge of first degree murder.

Vothke, the so-called Buffalo king of the alcohol ring, was indicted by a federal grand jury in Connecticut in 1922 on a charge of conspiring to violate the prohibition laws in connection with the theft from freight cars in the New York Central terminal of alcohol and whiskey valued at more than \$250,000. He was being brought to trial, his indictment being unfiled, on more than two score defendants who were involved with him in 1925, several were sent to Atlanta penitentiary for varying terms.

## SUGAR PRICES UP TOMORROW

PORTLAND, Ore., July 28 (AP)—Cane sugar markets will take another jump tomorrow morning, effective at the opening of trade. Thursday best cane will be \$6.35 a sack in the local wholesale market with best at \$4.25 a sack. There is an advance of 10 cents a sack over a total advance of 25 cents a sack during the past month.

Portland jobbers announced the advance following receipt of the advance of a similar rise in the refinery list.

Increased demand of canning season is held the chief market factor. Portland consumers enjoy the unique position of paying less retail than the wholesale market. With the jobbing price at \$6.25 for the past three weeks, Portland housewives can purchase 10 pound sacks of the best cane granulated sugar from their grocer for 80 cents. Values are still soaring in the local fresh sugar market. All grades are higher on the daily exchange today with extra and current receipts up 2 cents at 34 and 29 cents respectively. Other grades were posted a cent higher. Receipts are still light with yesterday's arrivals reported at 547 cases. Outside markets are firm.

Extra cubans are a fraction higher in the local butter market at 48 cents. Other grades held firm and unchanged. Receipts from the country yesterday total 14,742 pounds with the local make reported at 12,951 pounds.

BUYING MOVEMENT SENDS ISSUES TO HIGH LEVEL  
NEW YORK, July 28 (By the Associated Press)—One of the broadest buying movements in recent weeks, inspired by the unusually favorable quarterly reports of the General Motors and United States Steel Corporations, carried over a score of issues to new high levels for the year, or longer, in today's stock market. The volume of business was only moderately heavy, but commission house advances indicated a gradual increase in public participation.

LONDON, July 28 (AP)—An echo of one of the most sensational divorce cases England has ever known was heard today when a decree was granted under the legitimacy act establishing the right of Little Geoffrey Russell, son of the Hon. John Hugo Russell, to succeed to the title Baron Amalthe, now held by his paternal grandfather.

John Hugo Russell used his wife's maiden name, for divorce in 1922, although he was not the father of her child, and the case furnished a society sensation throughout the long hearing which resulted in a disagreement by the jury. At the second hearing Russell was given a divorce.
