DAVIS WOULD ABOLISH RULE

NEW YORK, July 23. (AP)—John W. Davis has joined a movement for abolition of democratic national convention rules which were largely responsible for his losing the party's presidential candidate in 1924 instead of Alfred E. Smith or William G. McAdoo.

Mr. Davis is opposed to the two thirds and unit rules. He intends to work for majority rule in the 1928 convention.

Others Agree

His views are in accord, partly at least, with those of at least 29 democratic national committee members who in May, "expressed themselves as favoring elimination of the rules that served to tie up the 1924 convention.

The first move to abolish the two thirds rule was made by Clyde Herring, Iowa national committee man, a McAdoo supporter, in a letter to the national committee.

We sell good paint at low price. It goes a long ways and people come a long ways after it. The secret is: we are wholesalers for paint and oil. We could even sell the other dealers and yet make money, but we prefer to sell to the man who uses it, on the wholesaler-to-consumer plan. KNIGHT WILL COME TO CITY

News that Nelson Knight, the umbrageous preacher who garnered 25 converts in a month of revival services here last winter, will return a week from Sunday to assume the regular pastorate of the Church of God is jubilating his prospective parishioners this week.

Mr. Knight has been consistently successful since he left the piney woods to following the calling of evangelist. Himself a logger for many years, he understands the attitude of the laboring people, and meets them on their own ground. He is said to have received his theological training through a correspondence course.

Comes From Eliza, Wash.

He comes to La Grande from Eliza, Wash., where he has been in charge of a church of God parish. With him he will bring his wife and their four children. They expect to establish their home here within a week or so.

Members of the denomination look forward to a quickened growth under their new pastor.

Only a little more than four years ago, the parish numbered 125 souls. Congregations frequently exceed the membership. The Rev. Carlos A. Plummer, first pastor of the group of church of God worshippers, is still a worker among them but concentrates upon the activities mostly of the little flock. He has a class of 25 beginners among whom he has enlisted several followers.

Church Built

Claude Pratt, who has served as minister since he came here two years ago, found the members worshipping in a little old store building at Spruce street and Y avenue. Every Sunday there were congregations too large to be accommodated. And so, although he had come here expecting to clear his 15 years of evangelistic work and enter business later designed to meet the financial needs of his growing family, Mr. Pratt could not resist the opportunity to serve his faith. He immediately started a thrifty building campaign and erected the church, now used at N. Avenue and Spruce street. It was through his efforts that Mr. Knight became interested in the La Grande parish last winter.
