This, in a word, was the fate of "Sonia Vronsky," beautiful daughter of a Russian overlord who held, with his fellows, that freedom of thought was a crime and that those who differed with the "upper classes" were doomed.

Alma Kubens, called upon to play the part of "Sonia" in "Siberia," Fox Film's gripping play, now at the Star Theatre for a three day run, has never seen a more difficult role and she has never done a more creditable one.

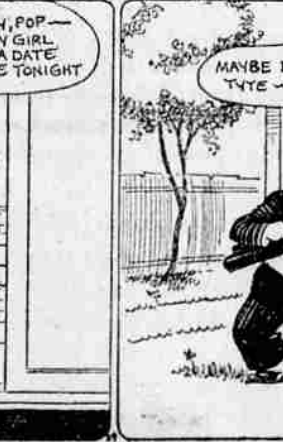
