BUTTER PRICE GOES HIGHER

PORTLAND, Ore., July 29 (AP)—Values in the local butter market, stimulated by the temporary shortage of fats and light make, continue to soar. An advance of two cents in prints is effective this morning, bringing the price up to 45 cents with cartons at 45 cents.

On this rise local creamery allowed the full advance in butter-fat bids with offers now at 44 cents for best churning cream delivered in Portland. Country bids are supposed to be around 42 cents but most of the country creameries in this district are meeting the Portland price as well as cream stations generally.

Receipts of surplus butter from the country yesterday amounted to 15,142 pounds with the local make reported at 11,492 pounds. Production is now at the low point with little prospect of an increase so long as weather conditions remain hot and dry in this district.

Surplus in Storage

Storage stocks, however, in this district as well as the coast as a whole, still show a huge surplus as compared to this time last year.

On the Portland dairy exchange sales are stronger with standards and prime firsts up a half cent at 39 and 38 cents respectively. Extras and firsts remained firm and unchanged.

Quotations on eggs on the local dairy exchange are unchanged for the day. The demand, however, is still heavy for supplies and bids are out at 31 and 32 cents for today's receipts. Arrivals in this market yesterday were reported 170 cases with a total of 55,025 cases in local coolers.

Sugar Higher Today

The 10-cent advance in the local sugar market is now generally effective with best cane at 36.35 and beet at \$6.25 a sack.

Bids of 7 cents a pound are being made for old or new pool in the local cascara bark market. Salted and green hides are a cent higher in the local market with seven cents paid for salted and 6 cents for green hides. No change was made in calf skins and 12 cents remains the general top.

Twenty cents is the general top today on country dressed hogs although a choice light pork will still command a half more in certain instances. Choice light calves are firm at 17 to 17 1/2 cents with real fancy veal up to 18 cents.

Light hogs and broilers continue slow and in plentiful supply while heavy hogs and springs rule steady. Prices are generally unchanged.

DATE TEACHERS INSTITUTE

SALEM, Ore., July 29 (AP)—County teachers institute in Oregon will begin this year on Sept. 5, when the institute for Clatsop county will open at Klaskan Falls, State Superintendent H. H. Turner said today. The superintendent is preparing the schedule of dates for other institutes but will not have them completed for several days.

Canadian Crop Report Lifts Values of Wheat

CHICAGO, July 29 (AP)—Assessments that spring wheat yield in the Canadian northwest will be 100,000,000 bushels less than last year gave a decided lift to wheat values today. Lack of rainfall in Canada tended also to strengthen wheat prices here, and so likewise did an unexpected upturn in Liverpool quotations. Besides, the cash trading basis for wheat at the Gulf of Mexico showed half cent a bushel advance.

Wheat closed strong, 2 1/2 to 3 1/2c net higher corn 3/4 to 1 1/2c up; provisions unchanged to 1/2c off and declines to the advance.

GENERAL MOTORS IS SENSATION OF TODAY'S MARKET

NEW YORK, July 29 (AP)—Another sensational jump of about ten points in General Motors, bringing the price close to \$1.30 a share overshadowed all the developments in today's stock market. The rest of the list rallied in sympathy, but the advance was not uniform, due to rather heavy week-end profit-taking and the uncovering of a few weak spots by bear traders. Business showed a marked expansion in volume, running at the rate of more than two million shares a day.

The closing was irregular. Total sales approximated 2,400,000 shares.
