La Grande Woman Now Visiting in Honolulu

HONOLULU, July 26, (Special Correspondence to "The Observer")—Coming in time to see the city abuzz with summer blossoms, passengers on the S. S. Matsonia which arrived here today from San Francisco were given a typical summer "aloha" greeting by island people.

Among those on board was Miss Grace Allen, of La Grande, Ore. As the Matsonia entered the harbor, scores of native diving boys swam out to meet her, and went through diving and swimming stunts for the arrivals. The native Hawaiian band played the melodies of the islands as the steamer tied up, while Hawaiian flower girls were on hand loaded down with floral leis to extend greetings.

Alma Rubens Heads Great Cast in Film "Siberia"

Those who witnessed the opening performance of "Siberia," at the Star theater yesterday, could easily understand why Alma Rubens was chosen from among three hundred motion picture actresses to portray the leading feminine role of "Sonia," in the Fox Film version of Bartley Campbell's success of the same name, adapted for the screen by Eve Unsell and directed by Victor Schertzinger.

"Siberia" depicts the reign of Czar Nicholas when free speech meant the firing squad or the bleak, desolate salt mines of Siberia. The screen version is faithful in its depiction of the dreary, wasteland, something the stage play lacked. It is ideally cast and well worked out.

She tells her father that she is going to teach the people and is ordered out of the house. Her brother, in sympathy with her views, leaves with her.

They go to a distant village. Here she teaches the ignorant children, while he, a physician, heals the stricken people. Then danger threatens, the Cossacks appear, and the embassy of the czar, looms near the girl. In the background is Igor Kaplan, a near-an-

archist and an admirer of Sonia. Sonia's school is burned, her brother arrested, and the pupils ordered to work in the fields. Chaos follows, brother and sister are convicted of revolutionary sympathies and Siberia beckons. How Leonid Petroff quickens to an overpowering love for the girl, how he fights and defeats her enemies and tormentors, how they win their way back to freedom and happiness—these and other factors make "Siberia" one of the most gripping photoplays ever seen in this city.

Miss Rubens, surrounded by an all-star cast, gives the most finished performance of her remarkable screen career. Edmund Lowe is seen in the leading masculine role. 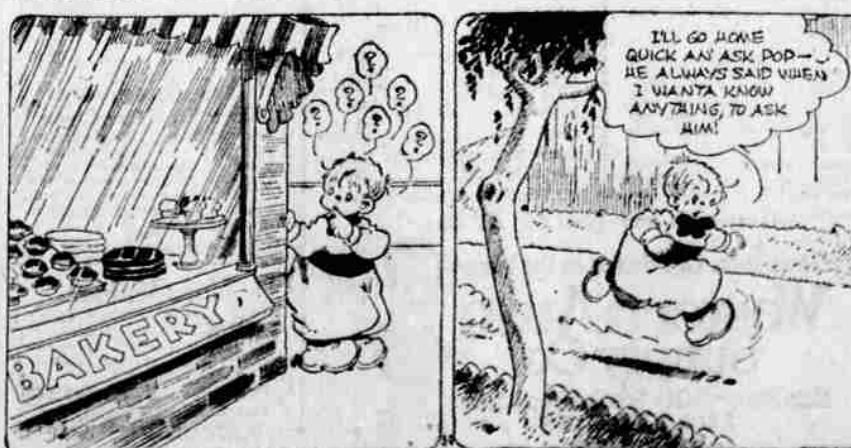
