Dance Funds to Be Used for Two Purposes

Proceeds from the greater Oregon dance to be given Tuesday evening, August 3, in the Elks hall room, will not only go toward providing funds for the building of the proposed fine arts museum at the University of Oregon, but will also help finance the Semi-Centennial, celebrating the fiftieth anniversary of the university, to be held at the university the week starting October 15.

Home coming this year will take up the greater portion of the last two days of the celebration.

Educational conferences designed to focus public attention upon the various fields of the university's work will be held on the first three days, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. Thursday will be devoted to conferences on music and art will, and on Friday events of distinct interest to alumni and students are scheduled, including a memorial ceremony in memory of President John W. Johnson, the first president of the university. Deady Hall, the first building on the campus, will also be dedicated in a fitting program.

During the 50 years the university has grown and prospered. Only this summer the student body supplied funds for the construction of a large pavilion and this year's plans are to build the fine arts museum.

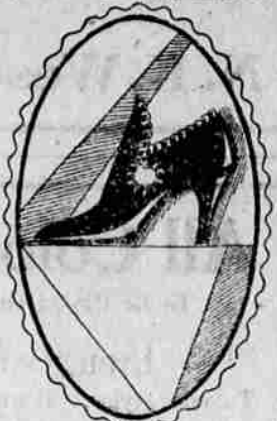

STATE EXPORT RANK HIGHER

Oregon boosted its merchandise shipments abroad during the first quarter of 1926 by well over \$2,000,000 as compared with the corresponding period of 1925, according to statistics released today by the Department of Commerce. The exports of this state totaled \$13,781,451 for January, February and March, as compared with \$10,575,447 a year ago, reflecting an increased trade amounting to \$3,205,994.

Incidentally, this increase enabled Oregon to jump its relative standing among the various states of the union in the quarterly race for foreign markets from twenty-fifth place at the end of March, 1925, to nineteenth place at the conclusion of the first three months of 1926, surpassing Minnesota, Arkansas, Mississippi, Tennessee, Alabama and Oklahoma.

Grain At The Top
Wheat, grain and flour, dominated the exports during the quarter, amounted to \$7,219,316. Rice and place fell to the classification, wood and manufactures of, with export valuation of \$2,831,759, while third honors went to apples, whose total shipments abroad for the three-month period totaled \$1,093,439. Items of lesser importance in their order, were: hops, \$729,611; condensed milk, \$458,912, and fish, valued at \$215,961.

California is in fifth place with \$65,652,164 for the first quarter; Washington is twelfth with \$24,828,955; Oregon nineteenth; Montana thirty-ninth; and Idaho forty-fourth.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 31 (AP)—The weather outlook for the week beginning August 1 was announced here today by the U. S. Weather Bureau as follows:

BREAKFAST—Stewed prunes with lemon, cereal, top milk, crisp broiled bacon, rye toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Cereals delicious, nut bread sandwiches, sugared cherries, cranoid cookies, milk, tea.

DINNER—Sliced jellied veal loaf, baked new potatoes, creamed swiss chard, stuffed green pepper salad, peach cobbler, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

Sometimes the familiar vegetables so unpopular with our families gain a pleasant greeting if served in unfamiliar guises. To this end, "carrots delicious" are suggested in the luncheon menu.

Carrots Delicious
Eight medium sized new carrots, 1 small onion, 1 teaspoon

salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 2 teaspoons butter, 1 tablespoon flour, 1/2 cup carrot stock, 1/2 cup milk, yolks, 2 eggs, 1 tablespoon minced parsley.

Wash and scrape carrots. Cut into thin slices. Peel and slice onion. Put prepared carrots and onion into sauce pan, cover with boiling water and cook until tender. Add salt when carrots are half done. When tender drain, reserving 1/2 cup of the water. Melt butter, stir in flour and when blended add stock, bring to the boiling point, and add carrots and pepper. Beat yolks of eggs well with milk. Stir into first mixture and cook, stirring constantly until mixture thickens around the vegetable. Turn into a hot vegetable dish, sprinkle with parsley and serve.

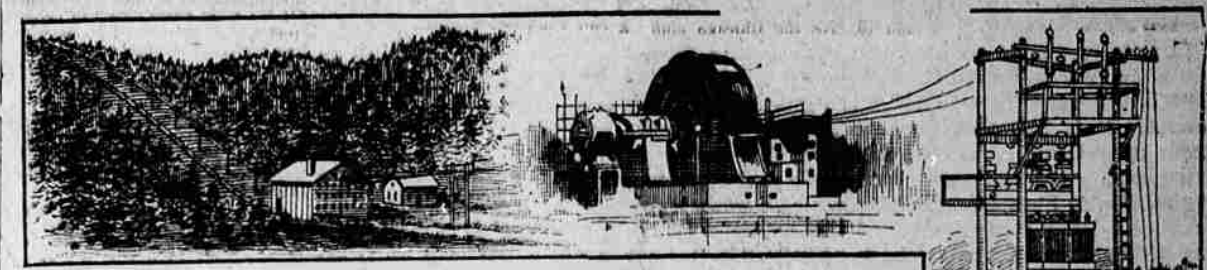
