GIRL'S DEATH NOT EXPLAINED

STOCKTON, Cal. July 31 (AP)—Mystery concerning the death of Nina Breakay, 16-year-old school girl, whose body was found in a yard here yesterday was deepened today when Coroner Oscar Pope announced that an X-ray examination had disclosed that the girl's neck was not broken; nor was her skull fractured. Physicians were delving deeper into an investigation to determine if possible the exact nature of the girl's injuries. An inquest will be held. George Pound, 22, who is held as accountable for the death of Miss Breakay, has made no statement other than that the girl fell from his automobile during a scuffle. He is being held incommunicado. He is booked at the jail as a "murder" prisoner. A special grand jury is to be called next week.

Scalded Child on Way To Complete Recovery

La Verne Holmes, 3-months-old son of Mrs. W. O. Holmes, who was badly scalded about a week ago when he fell head first into a tub of water that was being prepared for his bath at the David Bloomquist home, at 905 Lake street, is making a rapid recovery. His hands are still mottled with bandages and he wears a bulky protector on his broad little chest, but between the brown medical smears, his face is covered with smiles. La Verne had been living with the Bloomquists for several weeks while his mother was out of town. Elsie Bloomquist, who was helping to care for him, poured water in his tub on the floor and turned to replace the towel on the stove. In that instant he dived into the steaming bath and was badly burned before she could reach him. He was taken to the hospital for treatment. His mother had returned a few days before.

Jacksonville County Seat Record Lacking

SALEM, Ore., July 31 (AP)—Although the town of Jacksonville has for 76 years been the county seat of Jackson county, there is no record of the county's seat government ever having been established there. This was discovered by Chief Justice McBride, of the supreme court, in preparing to write the opinion handed down yesterday, authorizing the Jackson county clerk to certify for the ballot a proposal to move the county seat to Medford. Judge McBride searched the records thoroughly and questioned Jackson county attorneys and found that neither the territorial legislative proceedings nor the Jackson county court archives furnished a record of how Jacksonville happened to be the county seat.

The men asked an increase in wages and shorter hours.

MONKEYS ESCAPE

PARIS, July 31 (AP)—The feral population of the Bois de Boulogne has been increased by 50 monkeys of assorted species which escaped from the Jardin d'Acclimatation during a fire last night. Guards and policemen spent the night trying to trap the miscreants but found the task harder than the search for an escaped leopard there last year, and this morning the monkeys were still swinging in the tree tops.

MEXICO'S NEW LAWS EFFECTIVE

(Continued from Page 1) Italian legation the time was extended to 48 hours. The prelate, however, will not take advantage of this extension, and will leave for London, N. J., to visit relatives prior to proceeding to Rome. The government considered his presence in Mexico "inconvenient." He insists he has been neutral in all Mexican religious affairs. Monsignor Creani is the fourth papal representative in the last three years to be appointed. Woman Wounded The wounded in the fighting last night included one woman; two men, who sustained minor bullet wounds, and two firemen, two policemen and three civilians hit with stones. EPITOME OF THE MEXICAN RELIGIOUS TURMOIL (By the Associated Press) Causes. Laws effective today enforcing the constitution of the Quila reaffirmed by the constitution of 1917. These regulations provide: No foreign clergymen may function in Mexico. Church ownership of property is forbidden and all church property reverts to the state. Religious instruction in schools, convents and monasteries is forbidden. It is illegal for clergy or religious periodicals to criticize the government. Effects. Mexican episcopate ordered as a protest discontinuance of all services, in which 25,000 priests function, beginning today. 10,000,000 Without Priests. Some 10,000,000 Catholics will be unable to hear mass or receive penance, communion or other sacraments except baptism and matrimony, which will be given by laymen. The church planned to have 12,000 churches for worship, but the government ordered that they be taken over by committees named by the mayors. Ecclesiastical property other than churches, is closed under seal. Boycott Organized. An economic boycott has been ordered by organized Catholic laymen. Purchases will be limited to necessities. Troops have been called out at various places to maintain order. Government's Attitude. Church and state must be separated and the church must observe neutrality. President Calles regards it as final struggle between "light and darkness." Church's Attitude. Persecution is threatening religious freedom. The church demands immediate cessation of attacks. Pope Asks For Prayer. Pope Pius does not desire to interdict Mexico unless absolutely necessary. He has requested the

EDITOR JAILED

NEW YORK, July 31 (AP)—A telegram was received by editor and publisher today stating that Sylvester Perreaza, editor of El Correo De Chihuahua, had been thrown into a Mexican military prison for political reasons. The telegram was sent from El Paso, Tex., by Irene Perreaza, the Mexican editor's daughter. She said her father was "in life danger on account of intrigue of bad politics and government employees." The evening post today published a statement from President Calles of Mexico defining the position of his government in the present religious crisis in Mexico. The statement, sent in reply to an inquiry, follows: "The boycott has no importance whatever. The government has never tried to close the churches and will not try to do so."

The wire was sent from San Francisco and was signed "Helle Owens." An investigation in the Bay City failed to reveal the identity of the sender.
