Opening at 49.12 to the dollar and 95 to the pound, the franc rose without fluctuations and at the official closing hour on the Bourse stood at 57.55 to the dollar and 134.50 to the pound.

ROSEBURG, Aug. 2 (AP).—Arthur Dubell, of Canyonville, was brought to Roseburg today suffering from a knife wound in the back, while two companions, Lew and Carl Beals, are in jail, on an open charge, all resulting from a free-for-all fight which marked the end of a series of heated revival meetings at Canyonville.

The meetings, it is said, were conducted by followers of Almer McPherson, the preacher, the Rev. Mr. Schaefer, being also the mayor of the town. Recently the minister and members of his congregation appealed to the county officials for protection, claiming that a gang of hoodlums had threatened to break up the meetings.

Men Break Up Meet.
Last night, according to the story given officials, a party of eight or 12 young men entered the tent following the conclusion of the evening service and while the healing service, which followed, was in progress.

They were met near the entrance, it was stated, by the preacher who ordered them to leave, whereupon a fight developed. According to the Beal brothers, who are under arrest, several members of the congregation were armed with blackjacks, which were swung freely.

After the fight was over Dubell was found on the ground bleeding freely from a knife wound in the back. He was also badly bruised about the face and head, where he had been struck or kicked. Dubell and the Beal brothers were arrested and brought to Roseburg, the former being taken to the hospital, where it was found that his wounds were not serious, the knife having struck a bone and ranged downward.

Blackjacks Used.
Lawrence Boyle, another member of the group of young men, and who was sought by officers following the affray, reported at the sheriff's office this morning but was not arrested. He maintains that he was struck over the head with a blackjack and was struck in the face, his statement being corroborated by evidence in the form of two well blackened eyes.

Officers have called a number of witnesses to Roseburg for a thorough investigation of the affair.

MOTORS CLIMB TO NEW HIGH

NEW YORK, Aug. 2 (AP).—Leading another vigorous upturn in the stock market, General Motors today crossed \$200 a share, establishing a record high price for the present shares.

The tremendous buying movement in the stock which has been under way for a week or more, gathered fresh speed today, lifting the price more than ten points above last week's closing figure. Dupont kept pace with the rise and many other motor issues were heavily bought.

Excited bidding for the stock, comparable to the feverish wartime markets in which General Motors was a leader, threw the stock exchange into an uproar in the final hour of trading. Fully half the brokers on the floor milled around the trading post in a frantic effort to secure their orders a stock soared and in brokerage houses as the 200 mark was passed.

Before the close the shares attained a new peak of 201 1/2, a net gain of 12 points for the day.

Speculative enthusiasm for General Motors aroused by the company's record half year earnings was stirred up still further today by publication of a statement credited to one of the partners of J. P. Morgan and company in which it was said the basis for the present earning power of General Motors should much higher.
