SWAT CROWN FIGHTS

There is much variety to the batting averages of the major league this year. It has added zest to the beetle battle for the sweat crown.

Instead of Rogers Hornsby being out in front in the National, almost all alone, we find two comparative unknowns, Babe Brewer and Babe Herman, among leading contenders.

In the American League, Bob Fothergill, and Bib Falk are more than making things interesting for champion Harry Holman and ambitious Babe Ruth.

FALK BIG SENSATION

Unquestionably Bib Falk is the sensation of the year from a batting standpoint. However, he has come about his work in such a quiet manner, that his sterling performance at the bat has failed to receive the high consideration it deserves.

Likewise, Babe Brewer, who was once a pitcher for Connie Mack, has come about his work of leading the National without any of the "hooray" stuff and has been but little press-agented.

It is a rather strange coincidence that Brewer and Falk began their careers as pitchers. Both early showed a disposition to hit that won them berths as regulars.

INJURY PLAYED PART

Only a few years back, when Johnny Feyer was in charge at Chicago, he decided to use Falk as a pitcher, rather than an outfielder.

Just when it seemed his fate was sealed to go back to pitching in injury in one of the Chicago outfielders forced Falk back into the game.

It was at the Yankee stadium in New York and Bib Falk did to win the game for Chicago was to make two home runs and turn in a divine catch that saved the game after his batting had put the White Sox out in front. He's been starring at the bat and in the outfield ever since.

During his major league career, Falk's lowest mark was made in his first year, 1921, when he batted .225. His best showing was in 1924 when he totaled .352, over a period of five years in the big show he has an average of .298.

This year he has hovered around the .375 mark most of the time and with the season two-thirds over has maintained that strenuous gain.

Brewer, over a period of 10 years, has hit an even .300 in the majors, his best mark being last season when he hit .348. This year he is stepping well beyond that figure.

FINALLY MAKES GRADE

Bib Fothergill of the Detroit Tigers, who has been around the .400 mark this year, since given a place as regular, has always been rated a good batsman.

Never during his professional career has he finished outside the charmed circle of .300 hitters. He has a .324 average for his four years with Detroit.

Fothergill has an easy style, at the plate and hits more line drives than long flies. He is not noted

CHAUTAUQUE, N. Y., Aug. 4 (AP) — A good newspaper, read regularly and with discrimination, has been described as a source of happiness and the origin of a philosophy of life that will stand up. "If you would be happy, follow closely the news of the day," declared Edward McKernan, president of the Associated Press, speaking last night at the 32nd anniversary of the founding of the Chautauque Assembly.

"Contain Cold Facts of Life," "read and contemplate," he said, "for this is the beginning of wisdom. The one institution that without equivocation or apology reflects human nature and presents to you the bare, cold facts of life is the daily press. You are not well informed nor patriotically equipped for the duties of citizenship unless with diligence you follow succeeding events as they pass in review on the printed page."

"The problem of our society is not the ignorance of the uninformed but the loose thinking of the misinformed. The man who does not think at all is a lesser liability. The one who thinks, but has not learned to think straight is a social menace. We cannot think straight until we have a comprehensive knowledge of things as they are, and this is to be had only from the newspapers."

"Make MASSES Think" The intellectual independence of the editorial page has been established. The advertising columns have been purified of that which was intended to exploit. The Associated Press was organized by newspapers to give their readers bare facts of life and invite them to do their own thinking. The effect has been a social triumph. Today the masses are

thinking for themselves and naturally there is a revolt against the tabloids.
