are seen in the Catholic churches, which has been case every day since the withdrawal of the priests. The cathedral continues closed pending completion of the inventory of its treasures for the government.

Crooks Molest Women—A band of crooks has victimized a number of Catholic women in the streets of Mexico City. They have halted women wearing neckties with gold crosses and informed them that they were detectives and that it was unlawful to wear religious insignia publicly.

Police reserves with drawn pistols restrained crowds in the streets last night endeavoring to force their way into an already packed theater where Secretary of Agriculture Leon and a Catholic leader, Herrera Lemo, were debating the government's religious policy.

Public interest is intense in these debates, which are being held throughout the country between government supporters and Catholics.

At Cuernavaca a group of about 10 men attempted to disarm a policeman guarding the Sotoland church. The policeman killed the leader and arrested the other members of the group, who said they feared the authorities were going to give over the church to the Schematics, or Mexican Catholic church.

Father Excommunicated—Father Dinus Anguiano, the Catholic priest of Alvarado, state of Vera Cruz, who accepted President Calles' government's regulations, has been excommunicated and suspended from priesthood.

Bishop Guizar Y. Valencia, of Vera Cruz, who is present in Mexico City, has issued a manifesto to this effect.

The manifesto urges the clergy and Catholics to pray for Father Anguiano's conversion, saying he is 70 years old and that he probably has not many years to live.

Dispatches from Vera Cruz say that Father Anguiano asserts that he did not intend to rebel against the church; that he merely desired to point out his belief that the boys were had been misinformed regarding the religious situation because the government's regulations did not attack the church.

A dispatch from Mexico City yesterday said that Father Anguiano had written a letter to President Calles accepting the religious regulations and that the president had ordered the mayor of Alvarado to return to the priest his church, which had been taken over by the municipal authorities.

SOMERVILLE, N. J. Aug. 5 (AP).—Warrants for two more arrests in connection with murder four years ago of Rev. Edward H. Hall and Mrs. Eleanor Mills were today in the hands of Assistant Attorney General Simpson as a result of what he described as "an amazing story" by a new witness.

One warrant charges a man, frequently mentioned in the case, of being an accessory to the murder. Simpson said he would comment that this man be held without bail when arrested.

The other names Mrs. Nellie L. Russell, a negro, as a material witness.

Congressman Hayes B. White, republican, was leading C. A. P. Falgout by only a few votes.

In the seventh Kansas district, where the office was vacated by Representative Tinsler, Clifford H. Hope, republican, led the field by an apparently safe margin.

Four democratic and two republican Oklahoma congressmen were either unopposed or had large leads for renomination.

In the third district Congressman Charles Carter was trailing Wilbur Carlwright in the democratic contest while a close race developed for the vacancy created in the sixth district when congressman Thomas filed to oppose Walton.

Mitt Leads Davis—Former Governor Jonathan M. Davis, accused and acquitted of garden sniffling was trailing Donald Muller, young attorney, for the Kansas democratic gubernatorial nomination with returns more than half in, Governor Ben S. Paulsen, republican, was nominated on the face of the nearly complete returns.

The Kansas Klan fight was reflected in the apparent decisive victory of three supreme court judges who handed down an opinion upholding the order from the state and by large pluralities given the republican anti-klan candidates for attorney general and secretary of state.

Henry M. Johnson reputed Klan candidate, maintains an approximate 5,000 vote lead for the Oklahoma democratic gubernatorial balloting with two thirds of the vote counted.

W. T. O'Brien, of Enid, Okla., led the field for the republican nomination.

So senatorial or gubernatorial offices were voted on in the Virginias or Montana. Indications were the heaviest vote was cast in Missouri and Oklahoma with only light balloting in other states.

INSULL'S GIFT 'COMMON TALK'

CHICAGO, Aug. 5 (AP)—Frank L. Smith, republican senatorial nominee in Illinois, testified today before the senate campaign funds committee that during the recent primary campaign he "understood" that Samuel Insull, Chicago public utilities magnate, had contributed funds to his candidacy.

"It was common talk in the campaign," Smith told Chairman Reed. "In fact became an issue in the campaign and charges were made by opponents."

"Did you deny it?" Reed asked. "In a speech at Springfield during the campaign, I said that if one who had paid \$25,000 in reduced rates to the public wanted to contribute to my campaign I saw no reason why he should not do so."

The chairman of the Illinois commission, which controls rates on public utilities in the state, said he had no definite information from Allen P. Moore, his campaign manager, that Insull had actually contributed to his campaign fund.

The testimony is that the utilities executive gave \$125,000 directly, and spent \$2,252.19 for programs against the world court which benefitted Smith's candidacy.

Turning finally to the affairs of the anti-union league of Illinois the investigators learned from Dr. George R. Safford, superintendent of the dry organizations raised \$130,000 in the year ending last April, of which \$12,125 went to the national league and \$6,875.15 for "law enforcement."

FIRE AT TELOCASET—TELOCASET, Aug. 5 (Special)—Only quick and commendable work of train crews, and particularly the crew on engine No. 5407, saved about 150 feet of heavy trackage on the main passing track and the coal chute spur, possibly saving also the coal chute itself and the railway station, when a hot and uncontrollable fire whipped by a high wind here late yesterday completely destroyed three O-W. R. & N. company section houses and another building and a telegraph pole of the Western Union Telegraph company.

Much other railroad property was endangered while the fire was at its height, including the section foreman's residence.

The three main buildings destroyed were used as quarters for a number of Mexican section laborers, who had just come in from work when the fire was discovered.

V. E. Newport, railway signal maintainer, who also had a gut work and just reached here on his speeder, rushed into the first building to take fire and piled a chemical hand extinguisher. The flame made such headway, however, that his efforts proved fruitless despite his scorching hands.

The dry, tinder-like structure at once was a mass of flames, which quickly spread to adjoining buildings, fanned on by the strong wind which blew the long threatening

tongues of destruction 200 feet south and against the coal-dust covered coal chute.

One engine crew turned its hose onto the exposed side of the coal chute while two other crews with their engines right up against the scorching conflagration battled the burning structures in an effort to save the section foreman's house.

The engineer of one of the big 5400's ran his locomotive directly into the face of the flames and there played a high pressure of steam and water on the fire.

This engine, the 5407, an oil burner, with blow-off wide open and both injectors working at capacity, kept up a roaring fire in the boilers and fought the fire almost incessantly, while trainmen and the entire crew of section hands kept the rear of the saved buildings covered with water from garden hoses.

It is believed the first building caught fire when Mexicans started a fire in their cookstoves with kerosene, though this could not be verified as the men could give no explanation. Those laborers lost everything they had in the three houses.
