Post-War Vienna Pictured in Film At Arcade
 A picture of post-war Vienna, once the gayest city in the Austrian empire, is shown in "The Greater Glory," June Mathis' super-feature for First National release. The picture starts a three-day run at the Arcade Theatre today.
 "The Greater Glory" is an adaptation of Edith O'Shaughnessy's famous novel, "The Viennese Medley." More than a year was spent

on its production by Miss Mathis and a large company.
 Miss Mathis, well-known screen writer, produced "The Greater Glory." She is famous for preparing the script of "The Four Horsemen," which also brought renown to Rex Ingram and Rudolph Valentino.
 The picture shows the changes in the lives of a well-to-do Viennese family before and after the war. The scenes in the picture are authentic, and give a new insight into conditions in war-wrecked Austria not hitherto revealed.
 Heading an exceedingly large cast are Anna Q. Nilsson, Conway Tearle, Jan Kothly, May Allison, Jean Harlow and Lucy Beaumont. Miss Beaumont, a comparative newcomer to the screen, portrays a remarkable character, that of a slightly unworshiped maiden who is the prettiest girl of a large family of relatives and friends. More than 200 characters were tried out for the part before Miss Beaumont was selected.
 Cur Rehfisch directed the production. This is his first picture, although he has been associated with the screen for more than a decade.

Hoot Gibson Picture Now Showing At The Star
 Another highly amusing and wholly entertaining picture with that popular screen star, Hoot Gibson, in the featured role, is being presented at the Star Theatre for three days starting today. Gibson again is cast in the type of role that fits him so well—that of the comedy cowboy, and "The Man in the Saddle" makes a thoroughly diverting picture with

out a dull moment from the opening scene to the final fadeout.
 It is almost entirely comedy of the lightest and most whimsical nature, with Gibson moving from adventure to adventure with a breezy and engaging manner productive of the highest type of entertainment.
 The story is most unusual, both in plot and treatment particularly for a western, and places Hoot in the role of a romantic but misguided young man of the west who is occasionally getting into trouble because of his insatiable ambition to be heroic and romantic.
 He stumbles onto a ranch whose main purpose is the boarding and entertainment of eastern tourists. The tourists are looking for excitement and thrills in this wild west, and the ranch management conveniently provides both for them by staging synthetic bullfights, gun fights and lynchings. Gibson, taking all of these affairs seriously, makes himself a general nuisance, but adds material to the entertainment possibilities of the picture.
 "The Man in the Saddle" gives Gibson valuable aid in making the picture one of unmitigated entertainment. Ray Wray plays the feminine lead opposite the star, with Sally Loner, Emmott King, Clark Comstock, Charles Hill Mallos, Duke Lee, Lloyd Whitlock and others, in the cast.
 A comedy and Pathe News are also being shown.
