CANCER IN WOMEN

Member Gorham Memorial Institute Cancer research has been the one predominant plague which has resisted the most strenuous endeavors of the medical scientist.

That cancer is capable of complete eradication if it can be discovered in its earliest stages is the important thing for you to realize.

While woman like man, may be subject to cancerous degeneration in almost any organ or part of the body, she is especially prone to develop the disease in the womb or in the mammary glands.

In most cases, probably, it is not malignant; but these benign growths should be removed and studied under the microscope in order that malignant change, if present, may be detected in its incipency.

The great danger lies in delay. If left too long and it be cancerous in nature, the disease may readily invade the surrounding lymphatic glands when the hope of a complete eradication of the growth becomes more remote.

King Collects Weapons Intended to Kill Him

LONDON, Aug. 4 (AP).—One of the hobbies of the King of Spain is collecting weapons, bombs and other relics of the many attempts that have been made to assassinate him.

King Alfonso, accompanied by the Queen, arrived in London from Paris almost simultaneously with discovery by the French police of a plot to take his life. He became much interested in reports that his enemies had a new revolver and the monarch immediately started inquiries to ascertain just what kind of a gun it was.

The King himself is somewhat of a shot and is keen on keeping pace with the times in this respect. The courage and calmness of the King has long attracted attention. When a bomb was thrown at his carriage during his first visit to Paris, the King remarked: "I have received a baptism of fire without going to war."

The King has a jagged part of this shell which missed him only a few inches. Another relic in his collection is a feeding bottle which was used in an attempt to poison him as a baby. Another is the skeleton of a horse killed by a bomb thrown the day he married Princess Ena, granddaughter of Queen Victoria.

Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary) Breakfast—Stewed prunes, cream, thin cream, crisp broiled bacon, toast, marmalade, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Lima beans in tomatillo sauce.

One pint lima beans, 3 tomatoes, 2 small onions, 1 sweet green pepper, 2 tablespoons butter, 1/2 teaspoon salt, pepper.

Cook beans in boiling water to cover until tender. Add salt the last 15 minutes of cooking. Let water cook away as much as possible without burning. In the meantime, peel tomatoes and cut in small pieces. Put into a smooth saucepan and add onions peeled and chopped and pepper freed from seeds and the white pith and cut in fine shreds. Cook over a low fire until pepper is tender, about 20 minutes. Add butter and salt and pepper. Heat beans in this mixture if necessary and serve at once.
