master in my own house, and if anyone interfered I'd kill him."

Under Colvin's statement, Gaines showed the first signs of weakening since his arrest. His wife, Mrs. Elizabeth A. Gaines also seemed affected. When Colvin told of conditions in the Gaines home, Mrs. Gaines gulped and cast down her eyes. From time to time she shot a rapid, appraising glance at the prisoner by her side. Gaines seemed to avoid his wife's gaze, and several times opened and shut his mouth quickly.

Visit Green Lake

Gaines with the jury and court officials was taken to the scene of the tragedy at Green Lake.

The court limited spectators to three benches, seating twelve each. John L. Reynolds, a gardener, who was on his way to work June 17 found the body of Sylvia Howard Gaines, in an alder grove by Green Lake in this city, told a jury about it today. Reynolds was the second witness against Wallace Cloyes Gaines, Sylvia's father who is accused of slaying her "premeditatedly in an intoxicated rage."

Shoes Exhibited

Reynolds placed Sylvia's pumps aside for the jury. He said he found them just like that, with their toes pointing to the lake, and a few feet further along I came to the body.

The witness said the body was nearly bare with the feet toward the lake, and the arms "thrown up." He saw "over near the shoes some blood marks in the dust like they had been sprinkled there."

Called Police

Reynolds met O. B. Ripley and after the two studied the situation they telephoned the police.

Gaines gave no sign as his daughter's coat and dress the latter torn so that Reynolds said he could not identify it, were placed before the witness. Mrs. Elizabeth A. Gaines, stepmother of Sylvia, placed her hand on her husband's arm at times during the ceremony.

Brood Demand for Stocks

NEW YORK, Aug. 6. (AP).—A marked broadening in the demand for stocks featured the resumption of the upward movement in today's market. High priced industrial specialties, particularly those in which favorable merger or dividend developments are believed to be pending were again the spectacular features, but increasing public interest was manifest in the standard industrial and rail, the latter responding to reports of record breaking earnings for this season of the year.

ANNUAL LAMB CROP FIGURED

SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 6. (AP).—The annual lamb crop this year will exceed 2,000,000, an increase of approximately 10 per cent, George A. Scott, federal livestock statistician, says in his July report on the sheep and wool outlook. "The increase is almost entirely in the eleven western livestock states."

Supplies of slaughter lambs for the next six months will be larger than for the same period last year, due to the fact that demand for the first half of the year was at the same rate as for the corresponding period a year ago.

This is ascribed by Scott to the high prices asked for all other meats. Lamb prices averaged about \$1.50 less this year than last due to the lower post values.
