OAKLAND, ORE. FIRE DESTROYS 3 BUILDINGS

ROSEBURG, Ore., Aug. 5. (AP).—The yesterday morning at Oakland destroyed P. E. Haines' garage, R. H. Eastley's blacksmith shop and J. D. Wray's paint shop, all frame buildings. The fire is thought to have originated from a short circuit in an automobile stored in the Haines garage. The car, owned by Los Angeles tourists, and these others in the building were destroyed. A few tools and some equipment were saved from the blacksmith and paint shops. Loss is placed at \$10,000, with little insurance.

The Oakland fire department, assisted by volunteer firemen from the neighboring town of Stithville, two miles distant, succeeded in checking the flames at the only building that blocked their progress toward the Haines hotel.

Tourists camped close to the Haines garage barely succeeded in escaping with their automobiles, at the sacrifice of all their clothes, food and equipment. Citizens of Oakland sent them on their way with contributions of money, a fresh food supply and necessary wearing apparel.
