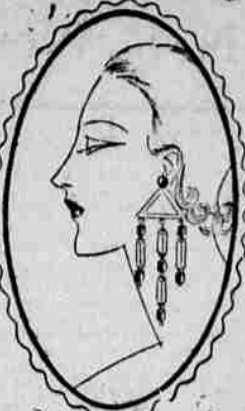
The subject was "Missionary Messages from Far and Near." Several letters from missionaries working in foreign fields were read.

Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)
Breakfast—Grape fruit, codfish balls, cornmeal muffins, milk, coffee.
Luncheon—Baked stuffed tomatoes, egg salad, cottage cheese with red raspberries, milk, tea.
Dinner—Casseroles of lamb, candied salad, stuffed cantaloupes, bean rolls, milk, coffee.

This is an excellent hot weather dinner. The casseroles of lamb uses a cheap cut and combines peas and potatoes with the meat to make a nourishing and appetizing "one dish" meal.

You will like the dessert, for it's both delicious and simple.

Stuffed Cantaloupes
Two small melons 4 ripe peaches, 4 cup red raspberries, 4 tablespoons powdered sugar, one-half cup whipping cream, 4 teaspoon vanilla, few grains salt.

Chill fruit and cream thoroughly before preparing. Cut melons in half, allowing a half for each serving. Sprinkle with powdered sugar and let stand on ice while preparing the peaches. Pare peaches and cut in thin slices. Sprinkle with sugar and combine with berries. Fill cantaloupe halves with this mixture and top with cream whipped until firm and slightly sweetened and flavored with vanilla. Chill until ready to serve.

Union Will Entertain Methodists

Forty-Third Session of Inter-Mountain Conference Next Month to Bring Church Heads.

The forty-third annual session of the Inter-Mountain conference, which is to be held at the First M. E. church at Union, Sept. 1-5, will bring a number of prominent Methodists into contact with the members of the denomination in the Grande Ronde valley.

Dr. Clarence True Wilson, of Washington, D. C. will be one of the session's most distinguished guests. He is head of the board of temperance, prohibition and public morals.

Bishop H. Lester Smith, of Helena, Mont., will preside, assisted by the two district superintendents, Dr. Edgar White, of Twin Falls, and Dr. H. S. Hamilton, of Boise.

Miss Colla Cowan, now on furlough at Homedale, Ida., from her mission work in China, and Bishop Titus Lowe, who has served the church in India, will be on hand with messages from the work in foreign missions.

Dr. C. W. Tenney, president of Gooding college, at Gooding, Ida., and the Rev. H. C. McAllister, one of the instructors on the college faculty, will represent the educational interests of the denomination.

The conference will be preceded by a reception the evening of Aug. 31. L. Z. Terrill, a Union attorney, will deliver the address, to which the Rev. W. W. Van Dusen, pastor of the First church, at Boise, will respond.

Holy communion will be celebrated under the direction of Bishop Smith as the session opens, Wednesday morning. The memorial address by the Rev. G. E. Press, of Wallawa, following a memorial service at which the Rev. B. F. Meredith, of Ashland, Ore., will preside, will occupy the greater part of the morning. The afternoon program will include a statistical session and a sermon by the Rev. V. S. Hall, of Payette. Dr. Wilson will deliver the evening sermon.

Thursday the anniversary of the Women's Home Missionary department will be honored, the Rev. Edgar L. White, of Twin Falls, giving the address. The evening speech will be by Bishop Smith.

The Woman's Foreign Missionary society will have its anniversary program Friday afternoon. Mrs. Henry W. Parker, of La Grande, state secretary, presiding. The address that evening will be by Bishop Lowe.

Mrs. Emily L. Quinn, of Union, will be hostess at the meeting of the Ministers' Wives' association Saturday afternoon.

Sunday, the conference love feast will be celebrated, the Rev. W. W. Deal, of Naampa, to preside. Bishop Smith will deliver the conference sermon.

An ordination service is to be solemnized Sunday afternoon. Following an Epworth League service with the Island City League in charge, the evening meeting will be addressed by Bishop Lowe. After the reading of appointments, the session will be adjourned.

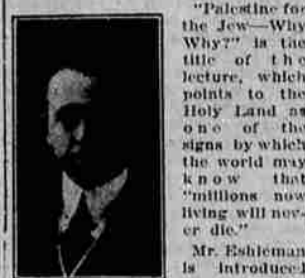

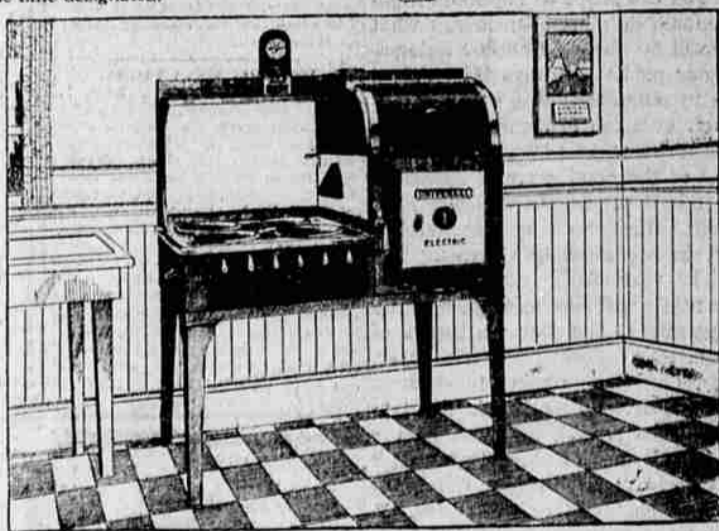
