**LONDON**—Young leaders of feminine fashion have introduced a new note in hangings and bracelets. It is a revival of the old link chain bracelet but more dainty and studied with precious stones.

The new bracelet or armband is composed of large, but thin links, from one to two inches long, and invisibly hinged. Some are hinged halfway so that the chain is supple and between the links are set large pyramid-shaped stones in blue, brown, amber or black.

Other bracelets are made of long oval links hinged together with bands of gold so finely worked that they look like lace. Another is made of different shades of metal with links intricately woven together to look almost like corded ribbon.

**DELAY—THE EXECUTIONER IN DISEASES**

To prevent disease and deformity is the most important job the medical profession has to perform. The next most important job of the medical profession is to cure people when they get sick.

In ordinary parlance, the profession, generally speaking, is "on to" its job and doing its work well and faithfully. In spite of this fact we are losing hundreds of thousands of people annually, unnecessarily, and are daily confronted with hideous deformities that need not have been.

One third of the deaths due to obstruction of the bowels, perhaps one-half the deaths due to cancer, more than one hundred thousand in the United States each year, practically all of the deaths due to strangulated hernia, as well as those due to appendicitis, are due to delay in the institution of proper treatment. Who is responsible for these delays and the consequent harvest of death? Rarely the doctor, usually the patient.

People generally consult a lawyer to keep out of trouble rather than to get them out of trouble. How much suffering and sickness would be avoided if they would follow the same tactics with their doctor and call themselves of his knowledge to keep them from getting sick!

## Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)  
Breakfast—Chilled cantaloupe, scrambled eggs with rice, crisp whole wheat toast, milk, coffee.  
Luncheon—Smothered onions, lettuce sandwiches, raspberry pudding, milk, tea.

Dinner—Veal cutlets, creamed potatoes, buttered beans, tomato and cucumber salad, blueberry gingerbread, graham bread, milk, coffee.

Do you ever chop your beets instead of slicing them when preparing them for the table? They look twice as pretty served in tiny pyramids and really taste better, since they seem to absorb more of their seasoning.

**Raspberry Pudding**  
Two cups red raspberries, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 egg, 1 cup milk, 1/2 cup flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoon melted butter.

Beat egg until light. Beat in milk. Mix and sift into first mixture. Add melted butter and stir into a well buttered baking dish and sprinkle with sugar. Pour over batter and bake in a moderate oven for 40 minutes. Serve warm with sugar and cream.

Any kind of small fruit can be used in this pudding. Larger fruits such as apples or peaches should be pared and cut in thin slices, removing stones or seeds as the case may be.
