key of giving every delinquent juvenile the utmost chance to make good.

"The industrial school is not a reformatory but a prep school in crime, and the penitentiary is a university of crime," affirmed Mr. Dana, who is a member of the state board of parole, in approval of what Judge Couch declared was his reluctance to commit a boy to a state institution.

American Business Men—If American business men lay aside all claim on their sentiment, they cannot from a purely business standpoint afford the cash drawer loss that America suffers from her juvenile delinquency. It costs the country 10 billions of dollars every year—20 per cent of the total of business turnover.

Urges Totalitarian—"The Rotary club can make no greater contribution to the good of the country than to undertake a systematic reclamation of American boy life."

Judge Couch also endorsed the Rotary interest in boys, and congratulated the club on the Hig Brother attitude that is a part of its program.

SHIP SINKS AT DOCK

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 9. (AP)—The lumber schooner Daisy, wharved here yesterday from Coos Bay, Oregon, with 750,000 feet of lumber, sank at its dock in the old China basin here early today. Captain C. Gillette scouted the theory that sabotage on the part of a crew member was the cause and advanced the theory that a bursting pipe or opening seam in the hull may have caused the accident. The Daisy is a ship of 679 tons, owned by the S. S. Freeman Steamship company.
