Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)

Breakfast—Froak plums, oatmeal with thin cream, fried beef, crisp whole wheat toast, milk, coffee.

Lunch—Open tomato sandwich, iced cocoa.

Dinner—Fried chicken country style, potatoes au gratin, French fried onions, cottage cheese and currant jelly salad, apple ice cream, corn sticks, milk, coffee.

Plums make a delicious breakfast fruit. They should be served whole after careful washing. Fruit knives and finger bowls are included in the "set up" for the fruit service.

Apple Ice Cream

One pint milk, 1 pint thin cream, 1 pint whipping cream, 2 cups apple pulp, 1 1/2 cups sugar, is teaspoon salt.

Combine milk and thin cream and scald in double boiler. Add sugar and salt and cool. Bake seven or eight tart apples. Scrape out pulp and put through a ricer. Add to cooled milk and sugar mixture and turn into freezer. Freeze to a "mush" and add cream whipped until stiff. Or the whipped cream can be added just before freezing. This ice cream can be frozen with or without stirring. If frozen with stirring use a part of ice to one part salt. If frozen without stirring use 4 parts ice to one part salt and stand four hours.

SHORT SIGHT

(By Francis S. Kellogg, N. D., Pasadena.)

Member Gorgas Memorial Institute Near sighted children are apt to be great readers. They cannot see distinctly at a distance and consequently resort to reading as a substitute for the play and games of their unhandicapped mates. Distinct vision is only possible at the near point.

Myopia, or near sight, unlike other visual defects correctable by glasses, is a disease. Neglected, it is liable to become progressive and lead to blindness.

Thirty odd years ago Dr. Hissay, of Philadelphia, stated that in the previous fifty years Myopia had been reduced 50 per cent in this country. He attributed this remarkable improvement to the increased attention to the eyes of school children during that period which resulted in the correction of visual defects by glasses.

Today, in the writer's opinion, based upon 20 years active experience as an oculist, that 50 per cent reduction has been easily increased to 75 per cent. This has been accomplished by the oculists of the country principally in their work with the school children.

The visual defects of childhood are often slight but important because of the plastic period of growth and the possibility of development in the wrong directions. The eyes of children should always be examined by an oculist. He alone is equipped with the facilities and permitted to use the measures essential to the thorough and scientific examination of a child's eyes. This is only possible by the temporary suspension of the function of accommodation only permissible at the hands of a graduated physician.

The function of accommodation is especially strong in childhood and enters into any examination in which it is active, as a misleading factor. Hence its suspension is essential.

There is a temptation, which is not always resisted, on the part of those outside of the medical profession, to bring this measure into disrepute, claiming that it is injurious to the eyes. This opinion is directly contrary to facts, and probably is most common among those without scientific training.

The Gorgas Memorial recommends that conscientious parents should take their children to a qualified oculist whenever indica-

Dry Farming Sections Not Ready For Sowing

WALLOWA, Ore., Aug. 10. (Special)—Farmers in the dry sections who expect to sow a considerable acreage of winter wheat are not favorably impressed with the conditions for fall seeding. The summer fallow in most fields has dried out to a considerable depth. In the opinion of many a large amount of rainfall will be required to insure good germination of seed. The ground has been so dry for the past several weeks that very few weeds have shown up. Some farmers have adopted the practice of allowing a part of their summer fallow to lay over until spring for seeding to hard Federation wheat. However, this method has not proved satisfactory in many instances this season, as the spring crops do not appear to have stood the drought season as well as fall sown crops.
