

HARVESTING OUTFIT BURNS

WALLOWA, Ore. (Special).—The first stationary threshing machine to start threshing in this section of the country, was totally destroyed by fire early Monday at the R. J. Conner farm about three miles northwest of here. The separator which burned belonged to John McDonald and was being operated by Potter & Roberts. The fire is thought to have been caused by an explosion caused from smut. A setting was just being cleaned up to move to another part of the field when the fire broke out. Quick work on the part of the crew in getting the burning machine moved a short distance from the straw stack and sick pile prevented any loss of grain. A plow was secured and some furrows plowed to prevent the flames spreading. The machine has been in use in this section for a number of years and it has not been definitely learned whether any insurance was carried or not. Threshing combines and stationary outfits are going forward rapidly at this time, the light showers of rain which fell over parts of the county Saturday are said to have been beneficial to threshing, making it easier to do a good job of cleaning the grain.

COOLIDGE WILL CONSIDER PLANS FOR NEXT YEAR

LAKE PAUL, SMITH'S N. Y., Aug. 11. (AP).—Visitors to White Pine camp, where President Coolidge today completed the fifth week of his Allendale vacation are expected to be more numerous as the chief executive enters what he roughly the last of his sojourn among pines of Osceola Lake.

The president has indicated that he expected several members of his cabinet to come to White Pine camp for visits during the summer. Two of his official family, Secretary of the Navy, and Secretary of the Navy, Mr. William H. Clegg, and on Friday Herbert Hoover, secretary of commerce, arrived to consult with Mr. Coolidge on departmental matters. Attorney General Sargent, whom the chief executive saw last week in Vermont, may come later.

In addition to the departmental chiefs, Mr. Coolidge has made plans to see other national leaders and persons prominent in the administration of the government.

The budget, arriving this afternoon will present preliminary departmental and bureau estimates for the fiscal year 1928, and Arthur R. Rule, an expert in cooperative farming and marketing who had an engagement with the president today, were two of these.

Mr. Rule is manager of the Federal Fruit and Vegetable Growers, Inc., of New York City, one of the largest cooperative farmers organizations in the country. His interview with Mr. Coolidge at the summer executive offices, it was indicated, would concern possible methods by which the government could assist cooperative agriculture.

Trusty Escapes From Federal Penitentiary

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 11. (AP).—The escape of Jay Floyd Williams, serving a five-year sentence at McNeil Island federal penitentiary, was reported last night by prison officials. Williams, a trusty, was sent up from Portland, Ore., in 1925 for using the post office to defraud.

The escape was engineered by a friend of Williams who was discharged from the penitentiary two weeks ago. It is believed. The discharged prisoner returned to McNeil Island in an automobile yesterday morning, leaving with his car by ferry a few hours later. It is now believed Williams was concealed in the car. Williams had served previous terms at Walla Walla and Leavenworth on arson and burglary charges.

OREGON GAME CENSUS TAKEN

Game animals are still fairly plentiful on the twenty-two national forests of Oregon and Washington, according to forest ranger estimates compiled for 1925 forest service. In making public the figures the forest service stresses the fact that these figures are only estimates, made, however, by the men on the ground who should have the best opportunity of knowing local game conditions.

According to the statement there are about 55,000 head of deer in the fourteen national forests of Oregon, and over 22,500 in the eight national forests of Washington; a total of approximately 81,500 for the two states.

Elk rank second with over 12,000 head, 8,500 being credited to the national forests of Washington and 3,500 to the national forests of Oregon. Next come black bear, for Washington, or a total of 11,200 for the national forests of the two states. The report shows 2,700 mountain goats in Washington, but none Oregon. Some 50 mountain sheep are listed about equally divided between the two states. About 20 caribou are given for Oregon; while 50 caribou and 15 grizzly bear are reported on the national forests of Washington. Those figures relate only to the national forest areas of some 25 million acres in the two states.

The summarized estimates for all the national forests of the United States show: deer 665,000; elk, 72,000; antelope, 7,500; black or brown bear, 46,200; grizzly bear, 2,600; caribou, 140; moose, 6,000; mountain goats, 17,000; mountain sheep, 12,000.

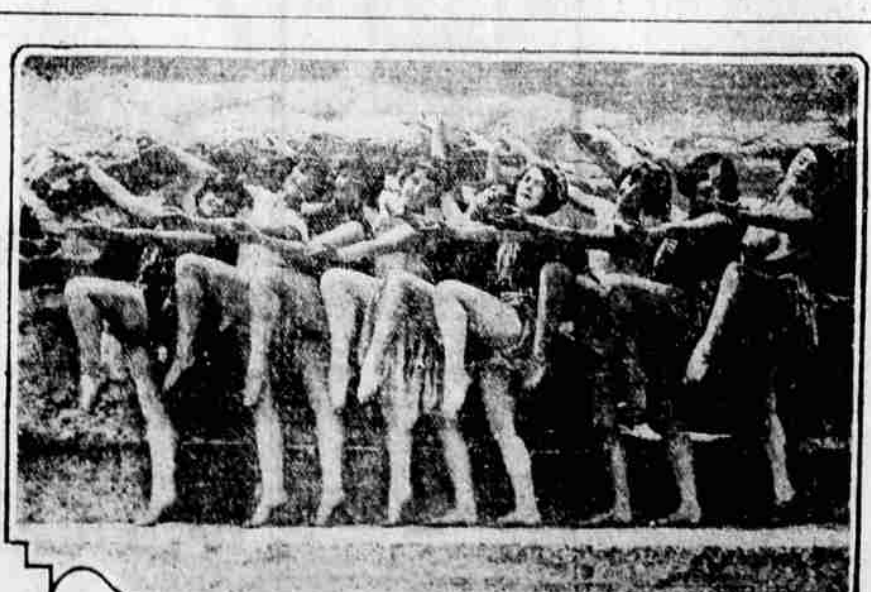
