Bob Custer Showing Here Tonight Only In "No Man's Law"

A real son of the open ranges in a real Western story. That briefly tells the theme of all the Bob Custer productions, the latest of which, "No Man's Law," comes to the Sherry Theatre today.

A point in which Mr. Custer's newest vehicle differs from many of the past is in its comical elements. The humor of the story is stressed. It has vigor, too, but the comedy highlights are decidedly the phases which will be longest remembered by those who see it. Custer's rise to stardom has been amazingly swift. A keen youth off the ranges a little more than a year ago, he has surged into the front ranks of Western screen headliners in the last several months. E. H. Tom Mix at Star in "Best Bad Man"

It would probably be impossible to crowd more thrills into a single picture than Tom Mix has incorporated in his latest production, "The Best Bad Man," which is the attraction at the Star theatre today, Friday and Saturday. "The Best Bad Man" was adapted from Max Brand's novel and the thrills follow one upon another so closely that they fairly overlap. The picture opens in New Orleans where Hugh Nichols (MIX) is sporting himself with a big Mardi Gras party. In the midst

of the festivities he receives word that he is being double-crossed by an unscrupulous contractor whom he had engaged to build a big dam out west. Disguising himself as an itinerant musician he goes West to see what it's all about and to make the crook toe the mark. This he does most effectively, in true Mix style, and the doing provides excellent entertainment. There is also a girl whom the nefarious cheat hopes to win, but in this he is also fooled by the supposed tramp musician.

The climax is one of the most spectacular scenes ever filmed, showing the blasting of a gigantic dam and the daring rescue of a girl by the western ace. Tony, Mix's equine co-star, also has some big opportunities, and he doesn't waste one of them.

A Larry Semon comedy is also on the program.

Critic Tells His Opinion Of "Padlocked"

What a critic in the Exhibitor Herald Magazine thinks of Rex Beach's "Padlocked": "Padlocked" is a much more serious drama than Paramount has been in the habit of making recently. It is almost totally devoid of comedy relief and, peculiarly, it seems more satisfactory for that reason. It is a grim story about pseudo-religious people and happens, incidentally, to pack a wallop for the self-appointed reformer which finds with a bang in just the right spot.

Nonch Beery is the holier-than-thou parent of Lois Moran, whose mother is played by Florence Turner. The purpose of the tale is to depict the disaster wrought by such

a character as that portrayed by Beery and to this end all by-play is sacrificed. The result is a strong narrative, a logical one and good dramatic entertainment.
