## HEALTH

### NO MORE GUESSING!

The saying that nothing is so sure as death and taxes soon will have to be modified, at least so far as the death statement is concerned. While ultimate death is fairly certain, the postponement of the coming of the undertaker is easily within the reach of everyone.

Public health laws, administered through the departments of public health in both city and state, and the practice of sanitation and hygiene, have been the factors in lengthening the span of human life from 33 to 58 years. But today we do not have to wait until the symptoms of disease before we may obtain reliable information relative to our physical condition. The diagnostic machines of science searches out our weak spots and puts us on guard to overcome them.

In the same manner that we throw safety devices about a machine that is likely to kill or maim a workman, just so should each one put a safety program of health examinations by urging or requiring a periodic health examination at least once a year.

The state is doing excellent work in safeguarding human life, and the workmen's compensation laws have stimulated "safety first" methods. Contagious diseases and accidents, however, only partly account for the waste in human life.

Chronic degenerative diseases, such as cancer, Bright's disease, diabetes, heart disease, and other non-contagious affections, seem to be increasing. Early diagnosis is the most important factor in the cure of any disease, and this is particularly true in chronic diseases which produce changes in body tissues, often without causary appreciable symptoms.

If one asks what is the result as to life saving where health examinations have been conducted, attention is at once called to the results obtained by one of the large life insurance companies in the saving of life among its policy holders by offering them free health examinations. Of the 7,000 persons who accepted the offer, whereas 421 of these persons should have died, according to the American Experience Tables, dur-

ing the same period. Earlier detection of the onset of disease is the goal of the Gorgas Memorial Institute. The result will be such a startling reduction in the death and death rates as to be unbelievable.
