

# SEVERAL DIE IN ACCIDENTS

**MPHFOORD, Ore., Aug. 12. (AP)**—Dale Cohen, aged 64, was killed late yesterday afternoon when struck by an automobile on the streets of Ashland, driven by Max Crowson of that city. The lad ran in front of the car, which was traveling less than 20 miles an hour, according to witnesses. Crowson was exonerated.

The boy is a stepson of R. E. Lee of Prineville, Ore., a painter for an oil company and with his mother had been camping at Ashland. The body will be returned to Prineville for burial.

**KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Aug. 12. (AP)**—W. L. Clinton, 63, for 23 years an employe of the Honeyman Hardware company of Portland, was killed late yesterday afternoon when a sedan driven by Mrs. H. L. Fleming, 625 East Couch street, Portland, turned over in loose gravel on the highway 46 miles north of here.

Mrs. Fleming with Mrs. A. M. Grilley, 464 East 28th street, Portland, and Mrs. Clinton, were only slightly cut and bruised. Mrs. Clinton is prostrated with grief.

The party was returning to Portland on The Bull-Calfifornia highway following a visit at Crater lake, intending to spend the night in La Pine, 120 miles north of this city.

A blowout caused the car to swerve into loose gravel and Mrs. Fleming's sudden application of the brakes caused the car to turn completely over. Clinton was thrown through the top, portions of which penetrated his skull. He did not regain consciousness following the accident.

None of the women are suffering from more than superficial injuries, according to physicians in attendance.

**SALEM, Ore., Aug. 12. (AP)**—K. E. Cahill, of Independence, is in a serious condition at a local hospital after a truck had knocked him down and passed over his body, crushing his abdomen. An operation was performed this morning.

## NOMINATION OF GRAVES CONCEDED IN BIRMINGHAM

**BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Aug. 12. (AP)**—Newsprinters opposing Elmo Graves for governor in the democratic primary conceded his nomination today with returns incomplete, although he has a plurality of only two thousand over Charles R. McDowell and A. H. Carmichael was a close third. A. G. Patterson was definitely out of the race.

The nomination will be decided by second choice votes under a primary rule which states that if no candidate receives a majority of first choice votes the nomination is decided between the two highest candidates by combining the first and second choice votes each received. McDowell's second choice strength is conceded negligible.

Hugo L. Black, candidate for senator, leads John H. Bankhead, the nearest of his four opponents, by 23,000 votes and is virtually assured of the nomination.

In the congressional race W. B. Stewart was nominated over J. J. Spight; L. L. Patterson was leading W. B. Bowling and M. C. Allgood was far ahead of three opponents in his district.

## MONEY MOVING POWER IN U. S. POLITICS NOW

**PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 12. (AP)**—Senator William E. Borah, in his speech at the annual Pioneer Day celebration at Cannon Prairie here today, declared that "startling revolutions as to the expenditure of money in elections" reveal "money has come to be the moving power in American politics."

He expressed the wish that the exposure of "money in politics" will "succeed in arousing the people to the real problem before us." In probing the work of Senator James A. Reed, Democrat, Missouri and his special investigating committee. The senator decried "political patronage" and in citing an example said that "the republican organization of the south is held together and sustained by the worst kind of corruption."

Senator Borah stressed principally "the arousing of the people to the necessity of dealing with those who run for office on the strength of money rather than upon issues," but he also continued his fight against adherence to the world court, and expressed opposition to the cancellation of foreign debts by the U. S.
