Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)
Breakfast—Baked peaches, cereal, thin cream, French toast, sirup, milk, coffee.
Luncheon—Molded salmon salad, rye bread and butter sandwiches, stuffed baked apples, chocolate crisp, milk, tea.
Dinner—Braised beefsteak, potatoes in parsley butter, corn on cob, string beans salad, blackberry shortcake, graham bread, milk, coffee.

The cut of meat you choose for broiling depends on the size of your family. A sirloin steak 1 1/2 inches thick will serve a family of six, a porterhouse cut the same thickness will serve four, while a club steak will serve two.

Chocolate Crisps
One and one-half squares of bitter chocolate, 1/2 cup butter, 2 eggs, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup flour, 2 teaspoon baking powder, a few grains salt, one-half cup chopped English walnut meats, 1/2 cup stoned and chopped dates, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla.

Melt chocolate and butter over hot water. Beat eggs until very light, beating in sugar. Mix and sift flour, salt and baking powder and add to egg mixture with melted butter and chocolate. Mix well and add nuts, dates and vanilla. Spread on an oiled and floured dripping pan or in moderate oven. Cut in squares or strips while hot. These are equally good for a picnic or afternoon tea.

HEALTH

HEALTH DEMANDS PERSONAL ATTENTION

Unless you are an incompetent, you do not put your affairs in the hands of a guardian. Your health is your main asset. And likewise it will pay you to give it your personal attention.

You can have any kind of health you want, miserable, tolerable, or excellent. There are people who cultivate poor health, and seem to enjoy it. But they are never among the workers, for the most important factor in preserving health is useful, honest work. It is a stabilizer. It maintains a harmony between the body and mind, and keeps each one normal.

The second important factor is correct daily habits. You know the old advice, "keep the bowels open, feet warm and the head cool" and you will not need a doctor. It is good advice; think it over. Thoughtful men after years of study have reached the same conclusion. Keep the bowels open, every one knows the benefits of exercise, eat light, vegetables and fresh fruits and plenty of water.

Harsh exercise to relieve periods of constipation are harmful. This is also well known. Appendicitis, gall-stones, cancer of the bowel, piles, are only a few of the results of constipation. One eminent surgeon claims that almost every disease has its origin in the improper functioning of the large bowel.

The third factor in keeping well is the periodic health examination. Take an inventory every year and see how you stand. The examiner can tell you if there is any insipient disease threatening you. You are warned in time and can take
