## FLOWERS WINS SLASHING TILT

NEW YORK, Aug. 20. (AP)—Tigor Flowers, Atlanta negro remains middleweight boxing champion of the world, after a sensational 15-round struggle with the man from whom he took the crown, Harry Greb, of Pittsburgh. Flowers made good his defense in Madison Square garden last night before 15,000 persons but did not receive the unanimous vote of the officials. Referee Jimmie Crowley favored Greb.

**Greb Wins Six Rounds**  
In far better condition than he was on the night he lost the championship last February in the same ring, Greb was credited by newspapermen with capturing six of the 15 rounds while eight went to Flowers and one was even. A smashing offensive which had the negro in trouble in the last two rounds probably drew the vote of the referee.

Flowers carried the attack to his opponent from the start, but Greb countered with stiff blows to the head and several times rushed the champion to the ropes. Both went to the floor during the fight after wrestling about.

**Flowers Injures Opponent.**  
Cuts were opened over Greb's eyes. His body was a target for the champion's straight shots.

The challenger's last minute rush was the old "windmill" attack without the cutting drive it was wont to carry.

Flowers weighed 159 1/2 and Greb 159.

### Billy Evans Says:

**SLUMPS IN BASEBALL**  
Slumps in baseball, batting in particular, either by the individual player or by the team, are really no way to satisfactorily explain them.  
Recently in discussing the secrets of his great success as a batsman, Ty Cobb remarked to me: "No matter how badly things are breaking for me at the bat, I make it a point to stick to my original style and I make a special effort to keep from pressing."  
"When base hits are hard to get it is customary for most batters to press. In other words, they either swing harder or commit some other fault that tends to handicap rather than help them."  
"The greatest danger when in a batting slump is to swing blindly and try to get more power than usual, in the hope that the ball will go safe."  
"To prevent such a happening, I shorten my grip on the bat and spread the hands a trifle farther than usual. This keeps the batter from swinging wildly, since he is choked up on the bat which must necessarily shorten his swing."
