Breakfast—Blackberries with thin cream, potato omelet, bran muffins, milk, tea.

Dinner—Baked cottage ham, potatoes au gratin, molded Swiss chard, tomato salad, meringues filled with peach cream, whole wheat rolls, milk, coffee.

Dutch apple cake is a delicious old-fashioned dessert that is sure to appeal to everybody—big, little or medium. Served with sugar and cream it makes a hearty dessert most desirable for luncheon.

Dutch Apple Cake
One cup flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon baking powder, 1 tablespoon butter, 1 egg, milk, apples, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon.

Mix and sift flour, and baking powder. Rub in butter with a fork or tips of fingers. Break eggs into a cup and add milk to half fill cup. Beat mixture well and cut into dry ingredients. Add enough more milk to make a soft dough. Spread in a shallow pan and cover with apples pared, cored and cut in eighths. Arrange the slices in parallel rows with the "sharp" edge down. Sprinkle with sugar and cinnamon and bake 30 minutes in a moderate oven. Serve warm with sugar and cream.

Artists Of East Join In Maverick

WOODSTOCK, N. Y., Aug. 21. (AP)—The artists of the east held carnival today. This was the day of the maverick, the annual costume festival of the Woodstock artists know to painters, musicians, writers, actors and other servants of all the seven arts throughout the country.

The carnival began yesterday but by midnight, with several thousand gathered in this valley in the Catskills, it was but well under way, and at dawn the end was not in sight.

"Brands' Taboo
The festival is called the maverick and in fact all "brands" were taboo. Academicus whose paintings hang in the great galleries of the world mingled and danced with painters whose futuristic offerings have been seen outside their studios. Members of famous symphony orchestras argued fiercely about counter-point and other mysteries of their art with jazz addicts who only knew music as something that comes out of a saxophone with a derby stuck over its mouth. And mingling in the throng, all costumed in colors the rainbow never knew, were dozens of real artists' models.

The villagers gathered from miles around, looked on and gaped. As the night deepened, the gaily grew. The party reached fever heat and the quiet halls where Rip Van Winkle slept witnessed a wild whirl of color and sound.

Campfires Glenn
In a glen a hundred campfires gleamed on brightly colored figures dancing on the grass. In a great hall tightly packed scores danced and shouted and, the unknown tread on the toes of the famous with great abandon.

In the crowd were such persons as Clemence Randolph, co-author of "Clair"; Robert Chandler, painter and former husband of Lina Cavalieri; Ben Hecht, Chicago novelist; Allen Dean Cochran, landscape painter of Cincinnati; Professor J. K. Shotwell, of Columbia university and Pamela Winton-Brown, widely known painter of miniatures.

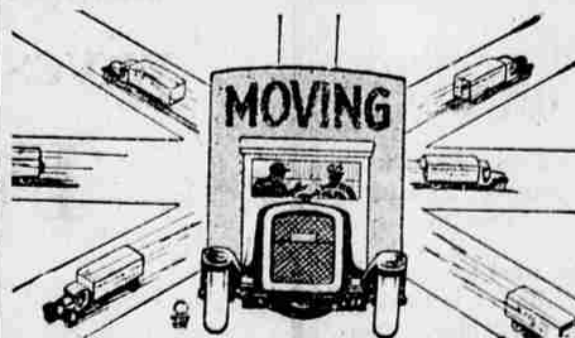
