(By The Associated Press) Hollywood, the city which took to its bosom the infant motion picture industry a few years ago, now is feeling the ingratitude of the child.

The movie business, now grown up, is walking out of Hollywood, or rather it is being crowded out. Apartment houses and bungalow courts, stores and office buildings are pushing the film studios into the neighboring towns where they may duplicate their feat of city making.

Hollywood boulevard, once the promenade of every prominent screen actor, is frequented less and less by the film stars. The numerous cafes which were the lunch and dinner time rendezvous of the heroes, heroines, stunts and villains of the shadow world have a bulking trade of tourists but a few of the former hosts of guests from the studios.

The little restaurant where Colleen Moore, Charlie Chaplin, Harry Langdon, Milton Sills, Anna Q. Nilsson and others foregathered almost daily in earlier times now has only an occasional table of motion picture notables.


