LAKE WORK TO COST \$12,500

HOT LAKE, Aug. 23. (Special)—Immediately following the laying of hardwood floors in corridors of two floors and on 60 rooms of the brick section of the Hot Lake sanatorium, other extensive development and improvement work has been started here.

To accommodate patients, whose number has increased rapidly during the last two years, three new examination and treatment rooms are being built on the sun porch. These will be reached through the laboratory or through French doors which have replaced the windows in the parlor of the brick section. A complete overhauling of the heating system is now in process.

This will, by the time the pipes are laid be a \$2500 job.

Improvements Extensive.

Twelve thousand dollars was spent in the improvement and re-furnishing of the rooms. Hardwood was chosen for the floors for sanitary as well as aesthetic reasons. Walls have all been re-tinted and silk drapes, curtains and rug placed in all of them. Some of the rooms are newly furnished and in all the furniture has been re-finished.

Though the landscape garden of the sanatorium grounds will be postponed until another season, a start on that work has been made this year. More than a thousand dollars has gone into hauling dirt to fill in a depression at the side of the house and the strip of lawn by the hot lake.

AN ENGLISH TIMBERED DESIGN

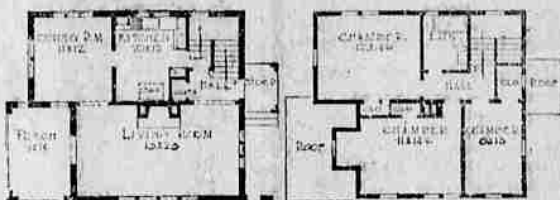
Just imagine this home, "your home" set back among the trees. How striking in appearance, how substantial in construction, the coloring of the materials used, seems to fairly blend into the landscape. Brick has been used for the first story (variegated colors) with brown stained timbers, contrasted in the lighter shades of stuccoed walls, variegated shingles or slate on the roof.

The plan too, is most practical; entrance to the side gives an unobstructed view from the windows of the living room up or down the street. French doors open onto a screened-in porch. The dining room and serving portion have been carefully studied.

The second floor arrangement is as ideal as the first. The bed rooms all good sized, with built-in closets. The basement is complete with the usual laundry, fruit and vegetable rooms, storage, boiler and fuel room. The walls inside are of the rough plaster for the first floor, and the lighting fixtures wrought iron, harmonizing perfectly.

Using the best construction throughout, it is estimated that this home can be built for about \$2500. It is a most attractive home and plumbing. These two items would run between \$1200, and \$1500. Keeping the entire cost within the reach of most home builders.

PROCRASTINATION IN EMERGENCY SURGERY

Every man and woman, even child ten years old, know that in ordinary life emergencies arise, which are urgent requiring instant attention.

When the house is on fire they know that action must be taken at once or with the least possible delay. They see the fire; they know from experience that failure to act promptly is the cause of the loss.

The same individuals who act so promptly, so intelligently in ordinary emergencies too often show utter lack of intelligence in their action when confronted with an emergency surgical condition in themselves or in the family.

They want to wait; they want to confer with a far away spouse or parent. In other words they defer. They use none of the intelligence displayed by the most ordinary individual in case of fire. They will wait till tomorrow or until after the wedding.

The question secretly the diagnosis of the most learned physicians and surgeons, and place their own conclusions in operation to those of the most skillful diagnosticians. They do not believe they have appendicitis or a perforation or an internal hemorrhage or intestinal obstruction; it doesn't feel quite like what they think such a condition ought to feel.

Hence procrastination in urgent surgical conditions accounts for a neat percentage of the total mortality. In acute appendicitis the death rate should be not more than one in a thousand if the operation is done before the ap-

FAIR BOARD TO RUSH BUILDING OF NEW PAVILION

ELGIN, Ore., Aug. 23.—At a meeting of the pavilion committee recently, the contract for the rebuilding of the dance pavilion at the fair grounds was let to Huxley Little. The contract specifies that the work is to be completed in 21 days, which will mean that it will be ready for the Union county fair on September 22 to 25.

The building will be the same size as the one destroyed by fire last week. It will be 46 feet wide by 80 feet long. It will be entirely covered by a roof, which will protect the floor from the weather, and will have drop siding. The floor will be made of vertical grating lumber, will be raised at the corners so that the floor will be better for dancing. After it has been completed it will be sanded and polished, which will make it one of the best dance floors in Eastern Oregon.

The pavilion that this one replaces was erected but a few months before it was destroyed by fire. The insurance adjuster was here Monday and paid the claim for the fire loss.
