Sioux Uprising Shown in "Frontier Trail"

There is a lure and fascination about "The Frontier Trail," Harry Carey's new picture that is being shown at the Star theater today and Wednesday, that is irresistible. One cannot fail to respond with a thrill to stories of the stirring events that actually happened on our Western frontier such a short time ago as 1879.

In "The Frontier Trail," Harry Carey is one of those men who stamped the West with the image of their greatness—a U. S. Army Scout. As Jim Cardigan he is a great friend of the Indians when they're good—and their special terror when they aren't. A newcomer at the fort is Captain Blackwell, who is new to the ways of the West and the Indians. When the Major's pretty daughter Dolly shows a preference for the scout's society, Blackwell grabs every opportunity to discredit the scout. When he interferes in Cardigan's diplomatic handling of some Sioux

braves Blackwell succeeds in offending the Indians, and all the scout's tact is of no avail.

There is an uprising that is but the start of many scenes of thrilling tenacity. In the excitement Cardigan is accused of treason and court-martialed. The Major's daughter helps him escape, but he comes out of hiding later to save her life. It's fast and furious action in an exciting climax that brings "The Frontier Trail" to a happy ending.

Harry Carey is at his best as Cardigan, brave in the face of danger and timid with the woman he loves, he is one of those appealing figures to whom your heart goes out in sympathy. Mabel Julienne Scott is a charming spirited heroine. Ernest Hilliard is a polished villain of the low code type. Frank Callahan gives one of his superlative bad, mad, characterizations. "Apple Horning, Nelson Meadows, Clark Hill Malles and Harvey Clark complete the cast. Scott Dunlap has given the picture his usual smooth and intelligent direction. E. Richard Schayer and Basil Dickey wrote the story in their most interesting manner.

Last Showing of Davies' Film At Sherrys Tonight

One of the best pictures of the year, from any standpoint. That is a terse description of "Lights of Old Broadway," Marion Davies' initial starring Cosmopolitan production for Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer and now playing at the Sherry theater.

As is usual with Miss Davies' pictures, she gives us a lesson in the history of America which makes us proud of being American.

This time she has chosen the colorful and romantic seventies when New York was changing from a struggling overgrown town to a modern metropolis.

The story is a much-changed person adaptation of Laurence Eyre's "Merry Wives of Gotham," but the change has been for the better. In this picture Marion gives to the picture-goes an interpretation of a dual role whose characterizations are widely different. By it she proves her versatility as an actress and binds her film fans much closer to her than in any of her former pictures.

In this picture we have a new Marion, with all of her former blonde loveliness, playing the part of an Irish colleen with a dancing act at Tony Pastor's old theater. She shows her Irish wit and her Irish nerve and she is a credit to both American and Irish blood which must flow in her veins.

Conrad Nagel, is excellent as the old-fashioned suitor, as are Frank Currier, George K. Arthur, Charles McHugh, Eleanor Lawson, Julia Swayne Gordon, Wilbur Higby and Manicé Betz in important and exacting roles.

The direction is the work of the gifted and artistically inclined Monta Bell, who outdoes himself with this one.

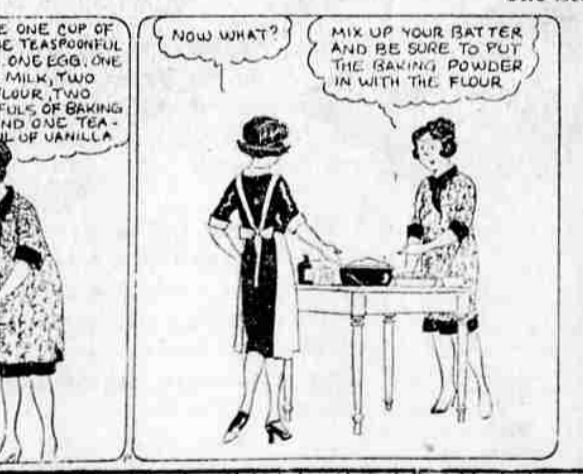
